framework, as occurred in the case of two of the predecessors of the "L-II." These theories are regarded as improbable owing to the improvements made in the design of the airship to meet such contingencies.

The loss of the balloon will apparently fall on the German admiralty, which providedly accorded the airship to the control of the

which practically accepted the airship on Sept. 20, Count Zeppelin being held responsible only if the dirigible failed to meet the requirements of the navy department in the tests conducted by its own officers.

Today's flight was intended as a test of the ascending properties of the dirigible, which therefore carried an unusually large crew to take the place of the machine gun, the bombs, the wireless equipment and other fittings which the air vessel was eventually to be provided with.
