FRENCH BATTLE WITH BULGARS

Hot Encounters Are in Progress in Serbia and Macedonia.

SUCCESSES FOR SERBS

Repulse Attacks Reported, Tho Berlin Still Claims Progress.

Fierce fighting in the region of Doiran, near the Greek frontier, be-tween the Serbians and Bulgarians has taken a turn in favor of the Serbs, ac-cording to an Athens despatch received by the Exchange Telegraph Company by way of Zurich. The first detail of four hundred German prisoners reached Nish Friday.

A Saloniki cable says that heavy cannonading is reported around Doiran, southeastern Serbia. The Serbians are said to have forced the Bulgarians to retire. The Serbians are advancing from Souvovo in the direction of Stroumitza, which the claim they expect to take shortly.

Helped by Weather. The Serbians are being helped by the weather, which is cold and winter-like. The rains have set in and are impeding the movement of troops and guns

"All the heights south of Belgrade are in German hands. Gen. Von Gallwitz's army has thrown the enemy behind Ralja, southwest of Semendria. Gen. Boyadjieff's Bulgarian army has forced a passage of the lower Timok stormed Clopovica mountain, 1198 metres high, and made prisoners of 200 Serbians. He also took eight cannon. The Bulgarians also have advanced toward Pirot. Gen. Von Mackensen's army up to the present has taken 68 Serbian cannon."

RUSSIA HAS CONCLUDED

Differences With Mongolia and China Have Been Amicably Settled.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17 .- An important treaty has been concluded between Mongolia, China, and Russia, according to despatches received by the Canadian Government from Shanghai. It delimits the rights and privileges of each of the interested parties in outer Mongolia, and settles the outstanding differences between China and Japan. The three principal is-Bulgarian frontier, according to an sues finally settled are: "Chinese suzerainty over Mongolia is acknowledged by Mongolia and Russia; Mongolian autonomy is recognized by Russia and China; and Russia's desire for a buffer state is fully satisfied. Railway agreements and mining privileges which Russia had formerly acquired are confirmed."

Russia obtains the right to establish an agent at Urga, with 50 guards and each Russian consul will be supplied with a similar guard. The postoffice in Mongolia is to be under Chinese postal service.

Provincial Conference on Subject to Be Held at Ottawa Today.

TO APPOINT BOARDS

Senator Lougheed Suggests That Each Province Name Commission.

OTTAWA. Oct. 17.—A provincial conference to decide what is 10 be done regarding the question of disabled soldiers will be held in the privy council chambers tomorrow. Sir Robert Borden and the members of the military hospitals commission will also be present.

The provincial representatives will be. Fremier Clark, New Brunswick; Premier Scott, Saskatchewan; Premier Norris, Manitoba; Provincial Secretary Decarie and Provincial Treasurer Mitchell, Quebec; Hon. E. H. Armstrong and Prof. Sexton of the Technical Education Department, Nova Scotia, and two ministers from Ontario.

A draft plan will be submitted by Hon. J. A. Lougheed. His suggestion is that a commission will be appointed from each province to co-operate with the central federal commission. These provincial commissions should include a member of the government, a manufacturer, a labor representative, and an expert agricultural man. Then there also will be local committees thruout the provinces. Actual land settlement and not land grants is suggested. Another suggestion is the filling of federal, provincial and municipal positions as they become vacant with disabled soldiers wherever this is possible. By a Staff Reporter.

Britain Must Raise This Number by Spring, Says Gen. Swayne.

FOES STILL STRONG

Germany Has Nearly Ten Million Men Available is Estimate.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—"Great Britain needs 3,000,000 more men by spring." This declaration was made today by Brig.-Gen. Sir Eric Swayne, director of recruiting in the northern command, in a speech at Hull Gen. of recruiting in the northern command, in a speech at Hull. Gen. Swayne estimated that Germany still has between 9,000,000 and 10,000,000 men from the ages of 18 to 45, and that, therefore, it was useless to talk about was used.
