A detailed bibliography of Beza's publications is appended to Dr. Heinrich Hepp's *Theodore Beza: Leben und Ausgewählte Schriften*, which forms the sixth part of Hagenbach's *Leben der Väter und Begründer der reformierten Kirche* (Elberfeld, 1861, 8vo.) Two valuable critical estimates of Beza's work are A. Sayons' study in his *Études Littéraires sur les Écrivains François de la Réformation*, vol. 1, and *Théodore de Bèze à Lausanne, Étude par Auguste Bernus* (Lausanne, 1900).

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
