CONTROLLERS AT ODDS WITH HEALTH OFFICER

Storm Arises When Dr. Hastings Orders Public Drinking Cup From City Hall.

The controllers tackled the drinking cup problem yesterday for the 'stealth' time. Incidentally they discovered that the big doctor who sits in the medical health officer's chair can hit back hard.

"We boss this lean-to," they said to the M.H.O. "You can run us if you like but not this building nor the innocent, defenceless inmates thereof. We be bosses of the city hall."

Fortified Himself. Then Dr. Hastings hired him to the city solicitor to seek legal advice on the matter. Yesterday morning he again appeared before the board of control to insist on the correctness of his position in ordering the abolition of the public drinking cup.

"According to this letter from the city solicitor," said he, "I have the power under the public health act, of ordering the removal of the public drinking cups from this and every other public building. The property commissioner is the man to do it in this building and I have so ordered him."

But, being stiff-necked and rebellious the board of control objected still and again and yet.

"All regulations adopted by the board of health should be sent to this board," said Controller Spence.

"Carried," said the other controllers unanimously and vigorously and also with determination. They were not to be moved.

any chances on the views of the aldermen. "I know my powers and will use them," he stated in a most conciliatory fashion. "I will report this to council as an order—not a request."

Controller Hocken got gas. "Why not supply syringes with which to squirt water into the glasses and clean them out?" he asked with unbecoming levity.

This was more than the M.H.O. could countenance. Assuming an expression of magisterial severity he handed out a stern rebuke to the light hearted controller.

"This is a matter of import to the public health and too serious to be made light of," he said chidingly. But the acting mayor wasn't the least bit scared at the aspect of the medical health officer.

"You take your orders from the board of control," said he to the property commissioner, who was waiting patiently in the neighborhood of the display of fireworks.

So ye public drinking cup remains for the present. But the fight is not yet ended—oh no—there'll be more presently also anon.

The medical health officer will eventually enforce the regulation re the public drinking cup in all the public buildings, offices, hotels, etc., of the city.

NO ADVANCE WORK. The question of doing advance work by day labor on the trenching for the duplicate intake pipe at the Island came up before the board of control yesterday.

Acting Mayor Spence wanted a start made at once, but the city engineer reiterated his statement, made at a previous meeting of the board of control, that to do so would be to waste both time and money.

Controller Ward voted with the acting mayor, but as Controllers Hocken and "Church" supported the city engineer, the entire job will be left to the contractor. Contracts will be let next week.

No Bridge Yet. The recommendation of the works committee that a steel and concrete bridge of 100-ft. central span be built across the western lagoon at Turner's Bay was not entertained by the board of control yesterday. They referred the whole matter back.

WOMAN OF MANY ACTIVITIES

Miss Agnes Sheahan a Person of Varied Interests.

Some idea of the many activities of a versatile and energetic business woman may be gained from the evidence given at the trial of the action of Miss Agnes Sheahan against the Toronto Railway Co.

Last year she was injured in a street railway accident when two cars collided, and sued the company for \$50,000, and got judgment from Justice Latchford for \$15,000. The street railway appealed and a new trial is being held before Chief Justice Latchford to assess damages.

Yesterday's hearings were partly concerned with the medical testimony as to the physical condition of the plaintiff before and after the accident. Then Miss Sheahan was examined as to her business activities. It developed that she had dealt in laundry machinery, old metal and junk, gasoline engines, lumber, bicycles, bakers' supplies. She conducted her own business by advertising thru the medium of the daily press.

Fined Auto Company. The Ontario Motor Car Company were fined \$20 in the police court yesterday afternoon for allowing an automobile belonging to them to speed on University-avenue at 24 miles an hour. They pleaded guilty.

WOULD COST \$25,000

Estimate of Board of Health for Central Dispensary.

The local board of health yesterday recommended to the board of control that the city establish a central tuberculosis dispensary. They estimated that it would cost \$25,000 to secure the site and put up the building. Maintenance was estimated at \$5000 per year.

"We are already spending about \$200 per year on this work," observed Controller Hocken.

"The most prominent physicians in the city have promised to give their services to the dispensary," said the medical health officer.

While the board of control approve the project they will confer with the board of health and other interested parties before making any decisive move.

Bicycle Thief Sentenced. George Richardson was sent to jail for 60 days from police court yesterday morning, for theft of a bicycle.

THINK THE POLICE SHOULD GET THEM.

The new regulation of the street railway calling for people to make enquiry re lost articles at the Lansdowne car barns was discussed by the board of control yesterday.

"It is very inconvenient for the bulk of our people to travel all the way to the west end of the city on business of this nature," said the acting mayor.

"I think that we should find out from the city solicitor whether we can compel the company to hand these articles over to the police."

"I think the common law will cover the situation all right," said Controller Hocken.

City Solicitor Johnston will be asked to report on the matter.

Noran Admits Guilt. James Noran, from Montreal, pleaded guilty in police court yesterday morning to five charges of sneaking

thieving from various houses in the city, which he entered by stealth during the day time. He will be sentenced June 29.
