Left Handedness

Left-handedness is discussed in an article in "Knowledge" by Professor J. Arthur Thomson. "The question as' to whether it is inherited is still doubtful but Jordan has investigated seventy-eight families, dealing with three thousand individuals, and his evidence goes to show that the trait passes from father to son," says the writer. "It is supposed that left-handedness is assodated with the greater development of the right hemisphere of the brain. It is, however, important to distinguish between constitutional tendency and the result of education. The subject of the address given to the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon by Miss Rouse, travelling secretary among women for the World's Student Christian Federation. Was "Women Students in Many Lands."

Miss Rouse's work has taken ner into many countries—China, Japan, Russia, the Baikan States, Switzerland, Germany, France, Finland and others. In all of them the progress of women the branches of higher education has been most marked, and the increase in the number of students enormous. In Tokio to-day there are 10,000 women students, and in China a large number of educational institutions for women have been established since the date of the Boxer outbreak. There are between 80,000 and 40,000 women students, and many more from that country and from the Balkan States leave their countries and pursue their educational careers in Switzerland, France, Great Britain, etc. Year by year the universities all over the world.
