TELLS OF ITS ATTRACTIONS SECRETARY HURT IN DUEL

M. Sarraut Wounded in Right Breast by M. Pugliesi-Conti.

Paris, July 13.-The scene of tumult which marked the enactment to-day of the law restoring Alfred Dreyfus to the

army was followed by a bloody duel to-night, in which Under-Secretary of State Sarraut was wounded by the sword of M. Pugliesi-Conti.

The duel assumed the aspect of a veritable combat between the government and the opposition, as M. Sarraut's seconds were Ministers Clemenceau and Thomson, while M. Pugliesi-Conti's seconds were M. Millevoye and Gen. Racquet, who were drawn from the elements which bitterly resist the government's rehabilitation of Dreyfus.

It was after the close of the session that the duel occurred. Later reports show that M. Sarraut is suffering from a deep wound in the right breast, penetrating the lung. While the wound is considered to be serious, it is not necessarily dangerous.


