TORONTO'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

ance and Expenditure for Past Year.

Inspectors Hughes and Chapman report 28,938 as the total registered attendance for 1895, not including the kindergarten classes, which have 4616 registered. The average daily attendance in all the schools was 23,129, in the kindergarten classes 1917, an increase of 245 over 1894. Average

ance in all the schools was 23,129, in the kindergarten classes 1917, an increase of 245 over 1894. Average monthly registered number was 26,238, an increase of 302 over 1894. There were 499 teachers and 107 kindergartens not including special teachers.

Three new kindergarten classes were opened during the year, making 40 in all, which cost during the year for salaries and supplies \$29,763. The cost of free text books amounted to \$4917, and of general supplies \$620s.

The total expenditure of the schools for the year amounted to \$414,832. Of this \$329,599 was paid out in salaries of teachers, officers and caretakers. Over \$57,600 was expended in new buildings. The city contributed \$371,518. The Government grants amounted to over \$22,000. Night schools cost \$4703. Fuel for the schools and offices amounted to \$20,584. The schools to which new rooms were added were Dewson, Fernavenue, Givens, Morse, Palmerston, Queen Victoria and Rosedale. Repairs, alterations and improvements to the various schools cost \$17,768. The 20 rented rooms cost \$4496. The board has 49 buildings. The value of the school property is estimated at \$1,536,808, the buildings being worth \$960,503, school sites \$523,393, and school furniture \$52,912.

Mr. Vokes scores a Victory.

A nice point of law was decided yesterday by Judge Street in the case of Stephenson v.
