WHEAT MARKET TOOK A TURN

Rush of Shorts to Cover on Chicago Board.

Caused by Reports of Damage to Crops and the Poor Harvesting Weather—Crops and Oats Higher in Sympathy—Gossip and Notes.

Wednesday Evening, June 28.

To-day witnessed a decided change in sentiment in the Chicago wheat market. To begin with the cables announced a improved situation at Liverpool, and this factor was backed up by reports from harvest sections to the effect that crop had been overestimated, and that harvesting weather is poor. St. Louis, where receipts of new wheat were unexpectedly small, turned buyer, and as a result of all these influences there was a late rush of shorts to cover on advancing prices. The September and December options sold at 2 1/2c per bushel and under a better demand for cash wheat the June and July delivery contracts closed at 2 1/2c and 2 1/4c respectively.

The Liverpool wheat market opened steady this morning and during the session there was a slight improvement in July and September wheat. The former delivery closed 1/2c per cent higher than yesterday, and the latter article at the same time was depressed to the extent of 1/4c. The Chicago market closed unchanged to 1/4c higher.
