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The Appetite of Birds.

A correspondent of the Glasgow Weekly remarks that the appetite of a bird is commonly supposed to be very small. As a matter of fact, it is usually exceedingly large. In the crop of a kestrel, for instance, have been found 70 caterpillars, 24 beetles, a field mouse, and, strange to say, a small snake. This, however, was merely a slight repast, and falls to give a fair idea of the bird's gastronomic abilities. For kestrels feed principally upon mice, of which each is responsible for about 1000 per month. A tame barn owl, in possession of the late Lord Lilford, once swallowed seven mice one after the other, three hours later, however, the owl was hungry, again, and ate four more mice.

Reacts That Drink.

Most of the higher animals—as monkeys, elephants, bears, horses, and dogs—have a natural fondness for fermented liquors, and suffer from the abuse of these liquors as men do. Managers of menageries and employes at the various zoological gardens know that the elephants under their care are prepared to go on a wild drunk whenever opportunity offers. Francis Graham is Dead.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 8.—Francis Graham died after a year's illness at his home in Detroit, Mich. He was born in England, in 1835. For some years he managed Hon. George Brown's stock farm at Bow Park, Canada, and then went to Goderich in an auctioneer. He came to Toronto in 1881, and was well known as an auctioneer here. He was general manager for the Maritime Co. of North America up to about two years ago. His widow and two children—Bernard J., now 25, and Marjorie, aged 26, a teacher in the Detroit Conservatory of Music, survive him.
