Taitchekiao, July 11.—A Russian correspondent of the Associated Press, who has just arrived with the Russian rear guard after a running fight from Kalchou, half way here (Tatchekiao), says: "We evacuated Kaichou to-day (Saturday) after a fight lasting thru Friday. We made a short stand at Pintzau, seven miles north of Kaichou. The Japanese kept on our heels, and there were constant exchanges between the Russian and Japanese batteries. The Japanese advance stopped eight miles south of here. The fighting along the road was lively, but our losses were small.

"There had been preliminary skirmishing and manoeuvring for position around Kaichou since July 5. On that day two companies were caught in the hills to the eastward and surrounded by six Japanese battalions. They cut their way thru, however, and returned to Kaichou, bringing many wounded."


