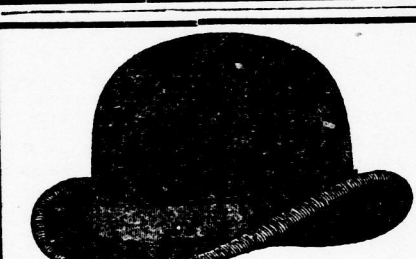

RACE DECADENCE

A GREAT DANGER

Highest Birthrate Is in Lowest
Social Class—Population
Weakens.

London, Sept. 18.—Widespread at-
tention has been attracted by the
alarmist opinions expressed on certain
vital social problems by Sir James
Crichton-Browne in his presidential
address to the sanitary inspectors' con-
gress. He discussed race suicide
not from the point of view of a failing
birth rate, but in regard to the close
relationship existing between unde-
sirable social conditions and a high birth
rate.

He quoted startling statistics which
proved that in districts where there was
overcrowding, where there was a super-
abundance of the lowest type of labor,
where infant mortality was greatest,
where there was the most general pau-
perism, where signs of bad environ-
ment, like phthisis, were most abun-
dant, and where pauper lunatics were
most numerous, the wives of reproduc-
tive ages had the most children. Where
there was more culture and education,
as shown by a higher proportion of
professional men, where there was more
comfort and leisure, as shown by a
higher percentage of domestic ser-
vants, there the birth rate was lowest.
