Playing of Isolde Menges Rare ing referred the proposition of the Lon It's many a day since London has listened to such fiddling as that of Isolde Menges, the famous young English violinist, last evening in the Masonic Hall. The scintillatingly brilliant "Devil's Trill" (Tartini) is to be the opening number of Friday's program, while on Saturday evening the Kreutzer "Sonata" (Beethoven) is to have first place, played by Miss Menges and her immensely clever accompanist, Miss Eileen Beattle, an Australian girl.

Miss Menges chose to make her initial bow to London in the Handel "Sonata in D Major," played with dignity and fine intellectual appreciation. The magnum opus of last night from a technical standpoint was the difficult Ernst "Concerto in F Sharp Minor," a wonderfully melodious work as played by this artist.

The "Sichlenne and Rigaudon" (Trancoeur-Kreisler) was delightful in tunefulness and rhythm. Next was given Elgar's "La Capriccloso," with captivating whimsicality. Then came a rollicking morceau, an old French dance, "Le Easque!" (Marin Marlas). Following immediately was a Berceuse, the composition of the 12-year-old brother of the violinist, Herbert Menges. A tender, melodious lullaby, in the hands of the sister-interpreter it became "Music that gentiler on the spirit lies, than tired eyelids on tired eyes."


