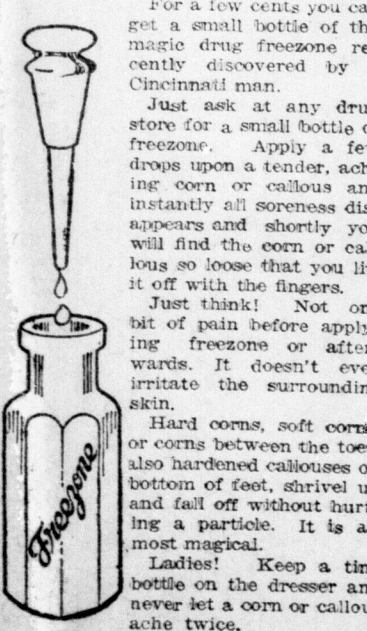

EMPEROR OF BRITAIN PARTY DEMOBILIZED AT CARLING HEIGHTS

Eight Officers and Two Hundred and Seventy-One Other Ranks Are Discharged.

A party of 8 officers and 271 other ranks, who crossed the Atlantic on the S. S. Empress of Britain, arrived in this city on Saturday night, July 12, after six o'clock, detouring at the Quebec street station of the C. P. R., and then passing a large crowd of relatives and friends at the depot to greet the men. The Canadian Garrison Regiment, brass band, was on hand at the station, and following detouring the troops marched to Tecumseh Barracks for dispersal.

Following demobilization, which was carried out by the staff at the dispersal station in record time, the veterans were served with luncheon by the local ladies of the Red Cross in the dining hall at Tecumseh Barracks. Though members of the civic reception committee were present at the station and the veterans were met by their homes, while the out-of-town men were conveyed to local railway stations, from where they proceeded directly to their respective homes in Western Ontario by the military authorities.

ELECTROCUTED HERO OF WAR BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS

Late Staff - Sergt. Harvey Davidson Laid at Rest in Local Cemetery.

The funeral of Staff Sergeant N. Harvey Davidson, who was electrocuted at Woodstock on Thursday night, took place on Sunday afternoon at the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. Andrew Weir, 346 Grosvenor street, with full military honors. The services at the residence and at the grave were conducted by Lieut.-Col. Emory, chaplain of this military district. Rev. James McKay of New St. James' Church also spoke at the residence. The deceased proceeded overseas early in 1916 with the 1st Battalion, served in France with the 1st Grenadier Guards, and was invalided to Canada on account of wounds in 1917. Since returning to Canada he had been employed on the staff of this military district. The high esteem in which he was held in the community was evidenced by the large number of floral tributes received, a cab in the funeral procession being completely filled, as well as the numerous wreaths that were placed in the carriage. Besides floral offerings from friends and relatives, beautiful wreaths were received from the A. D. M. staff and sub-staff, M. D. No. 1; G. W. V. A. Woodstock; Soldiers Aid Commission, Woodstock; alumnae, Woodstock General Hospital; the Sterling Textile Company, Woodstock; Davidson & McInnis, Woodstock, and the former employees of the deputy registrar under the M. S. A. The pall-bearers were six sergeants from the district headquarters staff. The firing party and band were supplied by the C. G. R. and the gun-carriage by the A. S. C.

A party of 33 hospital patients who disembarked from the hospital ship Aruguya at Portland, Maine, last week, arrived in London on Sunday morning at 8 o'clock, detouring at the downtown station. From the station they were conveyed in autos to Carling Heights by the military authorities who met the party.

Upon arrival at Tecumseh Barracks, the men were taken onto the strength of the Western Ontario Military Hospital, and given furloughs, and transportation to their respective homes in Western Ontario. The troops were served luncheon in the dining hall at Tecumseh Barracks by the local ladies of the Red Cross. Members of the civic reception committee were present at the railway station and at Carling Heights.
