

Ottawa, Mar. 4.-The new farmers' party, which received birth in the Commons yesterday through organization and the appointment of whips, held a caucus this morning to decide what action will be taken in connection with Hon, W. L. Mackenzie King's amendment to the address, which calls for a general election following the passing of a new franchise act, and the passing of interim supply accounts.

It is understood that the caucus reached a decision to vote for the amendment, with possible explanations for doing so by Hon, T. A. Crerar and others.

Among some the opinion existed that it would be better to defer an election until after a census and redistribution had been held in 1921. Such redistribution, it was estimated, would add about a score of seats to the prairie province representation. On the other hand it would rob Ontario of three members. MILLIONS IN BOOZE SHIPPED FROM U.S.

New York, March 4.—Demon rum, John Barleycorn and other alcoholic concoctions in sufficient quantities to make mor than 290,000,000 average "drinks" were exported from New York during last January—the greater part prior to the 17th, when the 18th amendment became effect This is shown by export statistics of the port of New York, made public today in detailed statements indicating that 3,384,766 gallons of spirits were cleared at the United States customs house with a stated value of house with a stated value of \$4.694,858. During January of 1919, there were exported 14.006 gallons of liquors, valued at \$52,417.

VERY LITTLE CHANCE OF CURB COLLECTION

Aldermen Opposed To Change in Garbage Rules.

NOT CONSIDERED YET

No. 2 Committee Has Yet To Deal With Question -Improvement Necessary.

The Mothers' Clubs of the city have needlessly alarmed themselves over the possibility of curb collection of garbage the opinion of city aldermen. This type of collection has never been officially considered by No. 2 committee of the city council, which deals with garbage matters, and it is doubtful if it will be. City Engineer H. A. Brazier was asked to present a report on the whole garbage situation. in cost between the present system of collection and the curb system, asserting that a daily curb collection could ing that a daily curb collection could be made for the same cost as the present bi-weekly collection from backyards. He made no recommendation that this be adopted, however.

Several of the aldermen are strongly opposed to the curb collection, and Ald. C. G. Moorhead announced today that he would not support it. There is, therefore, only a remote possibility of it being introduced in the council and little chance of it being adopted. would be manifestly unfair for the first few resdents to bear the cost of establishing the plant while subsequent home-builders would only have to pay a small amount for maintenance.
