COMMITTEE GATHERING INFORMATION REGARDING JUVENILE COURT HERE

Big Questions as to Whether Man or Woman Should Occupy Position.

A committee composed of Mrs. A. T. Edwards, Mrs. W. A. Tanner, F. B. Lavender, Dr. C. H. Reeson, A. Vines, Robert Greene, Dr. H. McDermid, Mrs. J. F. Thompson, Rev. T. D. McCullough and Rev. H. B. Ashby, is obtaining all possible information regarding juvenile courts which have been established in other Canadian cities, as well as the United States. One of the particular duties allotted to the committee is to find out which courts have been most successfully supervised, those supervised by women judges or men. At the last meeting of representatives of organizations interested in juvenile courts there was much discussion on this point.

The committee will submit the data obtained at a meeting which will be held within a few weeks at the call of the chairman, Jared Vining. Following this meeting, it is planned to make a recommendation to the city council that a juvenile court be established in this city.

Rev. D. C. MacGregor is of the opinion that a woman should occupy the position of judge and that the court should be apart from the criminal court altogether. Mr. MacGregor, in stating his preference for a woman judge, said young women telling their cases before men became hardened and hardened, and women should deal with women.

The question as to whether a woman should be a man or a woman will, in all probability, be voted on at the next meeting.

PREPARE FOR PARADE LEGS MOVE FAST, BUT ON ARMISTICE DAY COPS MOVE FASTER

Many Organizations To Be Represented at Meeting Tonight.

Five Youths Pay \$2 Fine for Using Bad Language in Victoria Park.

At the regular meeting of the Central Veterans' Council this evening, it is expected that all plans will be discussed for the Armistice Day parade on the evening of November 11. Secretary Lavender of the council has sent letters to nearly every organization in the city asking them to send a representative to the meeting tonight to discuss and make plans for the celebration.

At the last meeting, L. Whitehead was sent to the council as the representative of the L. O. Lodge of London to inform them that they would send four life and drum bands to supply music for the parade. It is also thought that the W. G. R. of the G. W. Y. A. and the L. H. R. bands will also take part in the music end of the parade.

Representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, and several women's clubs will attend as well as members from the various labor organizations. Gen. Penet, officer commanding Military District No. 1, informed Mr. Lavender that Col. Weir would be the representative from the headquarters staff. Some of the civic officials are expected to attend.

City Briefs
MEET TONIGHT.—The members of the Builders' Exchange will meet tonight in their rooms above the Bank of Nova Scotia at 8 o'clock. General business will be dealt with.

BANK CLEARINGS.—The bank clearing for this week increased \$79,465 over that of the corresponding week last year, when they totaled \$3,361,048. For this week, they were \$3,440,513.

MINOR IMPROVEMENTS.—A number of minor improvements are under way at the office of the City Clerk's Aid Society in the city hall. A private office for Inspector W. J. Kelly is being added to the erection of a partition. This will afford more privacy for persons interviewing him and will leave an ante-room for other callers.

ELECTION PREPARATIONS.—With voters' lists completed, City Clerk S. Baker, in new busy with other preparations for the election in January. He has been authorized by the council to have the literature of the election sent out to voters last year. This will include "Information for Voters" on the various ballots to be submitted, "City Activities" during the year, together with a financial statement and complete lists of candidates for all municipal offices.

"DOCTOR OF FISH"
NEXT IN DEGREES

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 2.—Bachelor of Codfish, Doctor of Halibut, and Master of Mackerel may come into common usage as scholarly degrees if the proposed Government College of Fisheries is established at Halifax.

Professor Gill, director of the \$100,000 fund voted by the Canadian Government for technical education and industrial training, it is expected, will co-operate with the maritime branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, in financing and developing the unique university of a similar school may be founded in British Columbia.

Plans for the school are the outgrowth of an active and working in the Dominion Parliament for a more aggressive policy in the development of Atlantic fisheries. The school as proposed would provide instruction in seamanship, navigation, construction and operation of motor engine, improved methods of curing and catching fish and utilization of their by-products.

Germany before the war maintained 20 fisheries schools. Great Britain had a large school at Grimsby and smaller ones at other ports, while Norway and Japan also have provided facilities for the special education of fishermen. The output of Canada's Atlantic fisheries is now valued at \$25,000,000, and with the application of greater technical knowledge, it is believed, their annual production will be vastly increased.

TWO APPEALS
Court of Revision Dismisses One, While Other Is Adjourned.

Two appeals against decisions of the court of revision were brought before Judge Talbot Macbeth today. The case of John Garvey, who claimed he was over-assessed, was adjourned. He claimed the buildings in question were worth only \$20,000, while the court of revision valued them at \$50,000. T. F. Kingmill appealed against business assessments on a warehouse at the rear of his main store. He argued that it was not used for business purposes. The appeal was not allowed.

MARYLAND REPUBLICAN. BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 2.—Virtually complete returns from the state give Cox 173,128; Harding, 224,201; Deba, 484. Four out of five members of the House known to be elected are Republicans.

Neither the wits nor the legs of five youths, arrested in Victoria Park on Saturday night on the charge of disorderly conduct, were a match for those of two policemen whom they encountered, so they were fined \$2 and costs each when they appeared before Magistrate Graydon in police court this morning.

The five youths were cutting across Victoria Park, and while in the carolous mood, they were seen by two policemen. They used language which grated on the ears of the two officers, so the policemen rounded up three of them. When the constables gave the boys the signal to stop, two of them started to run.

Such actions had the same effect on the policemen, so leaving the three standing in the path, the guardians of the peace and the English language, gave pursuit. The chase did not last long, for the two boys were trippingly marched back, the other three were nowhere to be found.

This disorderly conduct, however, did not block the wheels of justice, for the policeman, learning the names of the boys and their addresses, had them summoned into court. As Saturday night was Halloween the magistrate took a lenient view of the matter.

S. A. C. EMPLOYMENT DEPT. DOING BIG WORK
The employment department of the soldiers' aid commission sent 170 men during the past month, Secretary Ed H. Lance announced last night. Sgt. Major William C. Smith is in charge of this work.

The situation is not considered exceptionally serious, but of the men have been calling at the office daily for some time past. One vexing feature of the matter is the placing of men who have been earning big wages in automobile factories in the United States, but who after being thrown out of work, return to the city, without having learned a trade.

paralyzed American international policy," and express the conviction that the result of the election will be a friendly Franco-American friendship.

Several organs, however, insist upon the importance of the uncertainty which exists concerning the liquidation of President Wilson's foreign policy. "By his order of the day," declares the Matin, "Senator Harding deserves the confidence of the French people."

Hope is expressed by the Echo de Paris that "the discussion which will be started on relations between the United States and the League of Nations will provide occasion to repair some of the faults committed at Versailles."

MEXICAN PRESS IS OPTIMISTIC, DUE TO HARDING'S SUCCESS.
Mexico City, Nov. 4.—Reports of the election in the United States were given the entire front pages of newspapers and the literature of the election was taken by the Mexican public generally in the result of the campaign. Only a few exceptions were noted. The Excelsior and El Heraldo de Mexico, ventured to speculate editorially on what a Republican victory in the United States means for this country.

The former sees immediate recognition as the result of the election and the other, after asserting Senator Harding has not been a vigorous Mexican critic, admits the election "will at least not be an obstacle to good relations between Mexico and the United States."

Sen. Wilson, which won the election, a personal rebuke for President Wilson, asserts he now "can scarcely be expected to continue his policy of recognition of the Mexican Republic, which in the past has been a hostile attitude toward this country."

The Republican triumph," the newspaper continues, "is an obstacle to unconditional recognition of Mexico, and our Government cannot accept it otherwise."

TIED OF "ONE MAN RULE"
The leading British provincial newspapers consider the election of Senator Harding to the presidency a tie of what the journals call "one man rule." The Liverpool Post says: "Senator Harding goes to the White House as the representative of the profound belief, long maturing among the leaders of the nation, that Wilsonism is alien to United States traditions and that the United States should not entangle herself in the affairs of distracted Europe."

NOISE PROOF PHONE PERFECTED IN LONDON
London, Nov. 2.—Harnessing the human larynx to such a way that it is possible to carry on a conversation direct from the throat instead of the mouth is the latest thing in telephonic advancement, now being exhibited in London.

A special apparatus has been designed for fire brigades, enabling a superintendent to be in constant touch with his masked men, and to converse on a direct line with the firemen working in other parts of the burning building. The invention can also be used between chauffeur and motor car passenger, between pilot and passenger, in noisy workshops, in railway tunnels and in marine engine rooms. The submarine worker can talk to the men at the surface or to another diver below. He can also make signals to the operator by simply dropping his jaw to the switch, this movement working a switch.
