

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 2.—Bachelor of Codfish, Doctor of Halibut, and Master of Mackerel may come into common usage as scholarly degrees if the proposed Government College of Fisheries is established at Halifax.

Professor Gill. director of the \$10,000,000 fund voted by the Canadian Government for technical education and industrial training, it is expected will industrial training, it is expected, will co-operate with the maritime branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, in financing and developing the unique universty. A similar school may be founded in British Columbia. founded in British Columbia.

Plans for the school are the outgrowth of an agitation in the Dominion Parliament for a more aggressive policy in the development of Atlantic fisheries. The school as proposed would provide instruction in seamanship, navigation, construction and operation of motor engines, improved methods of curing and catching fish and utilization of their by-products.

NOISE PROOF PHONE PERFECTED IN LONDON

London. Nov. 2. — Harnessing the human larynx in such a way that it is possible to carry on a conversation direct from the throat instead of the mouth is the latest thing in telephonic advancement, now being exhibited in London.

An advantage claimed for the "Laryngaphone" is that it is unaffected by external noises, no sound but the human voice being heard.

The transmitter is about the size of a wrist watch. It gathers up the vibrations direct from the vocal chords when it is placed in contact with the throat and the sounds are plainly heard in the receiver.

A special apparatus has been designed for fire brigades, enabling a superintendent to be in constant touch with his masked men, and to converse with them readily. Hosemen working on ladders and roof tops can keep in telephone touch with those working in other parts of the burning building. The invention can also be used between chauffeur and motor car passenger, hetween air pilot and passenger in noisy workshops, in railway tunnels and in marine engine rooms. The submarine worker can talk to the men at the surface or to another diver below.
