SCHOOL BOARD CHANGE THE HEATING SYSTEM

Will Cost \$400 Additional—Applications Already For Staff of Unbuilt School.

WEST TORONTO, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—The school board held a special meeting to-night to discuss the kind of heating apparatus that should be installed in the new school, which is being built at the corner of Louisa and Elizabeth-streets.

Bloxham & Saxon, the building contractors, sub-let the heating contract to a firm who proposed to install the Pease system. The price was to be \$2300. After a lot of discussion pro and con, the board decided to install the low pressure aspirating system instead of the Pease. This will cost \$400 extra. Bloxham & Saxon will arrange with the heating contractors to have the contract changed.

Altho the soil has only been broken for the building of the new Elizabeth-street school, applications for the teaching staff have already begun to come in. The latest of these is from E. P. Evans, who has had charge of part I class in St. Clair-avenue school. Two other applications have been received, both of which are from St. Clair-avenue school. The applications were referred to the management committee.

On motion of Trustees Dodds and Wright it was decided to lay a cement approach to Western-avenue school, the cost of which is not to exceed \$80. The board decided to put a wooden fence round the gravel pit situated near Carlton school. The pit as it is at present is rather dangerous for children playing around.

The school board is to get into their possession the debentures that have been issued to enable them to raise money for the building of the new school. HANGS BY HIS TEETH 150 FEET IN THE AIR

Acrobat at Coney Island Rescued in Net After Being Suspended For Fifteen Minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Suspended in midair 150 feet above a wooden bridge over the lagoon in front of the Dreamland tower at Coney Island during a rainstorm, William Howard, an acrobat, hung for more than fifteen minutes, his teeth clenching a leather strap.

At the end of that time a large net had been obtained by park employees and, exhausted and only half conscious, Howard dropped into it. As he landed safely four thousand people, who stood in the rain, expecting every moment to see the man fall to the bridge, cheered for several minutes.

With his wife, Howard performs on a bicycle on a slack wire extending from a point midway up the tower to a pole on the chutes. At the end of the bicycle act he performs a slight feat, where a wire cable, hanging to a strap with his teeth, is pulled to the distance from the end, 800 feet, the coil of wire at the top of the chute unwound suddenly.

Howard's body dropped with the wire, but he kept his grip on the strap. Raising his hands above his head, he seized the strap with both hands and held on. He was unable either to move forward or to go backward, but hung in mid-air until rescued in the net.

His body was limp when it struck the net and he was carried to the Park Hospital. His mouth had been badly lacerated.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR MEET IN TORONTO NEXT WEEK

Twenty-Fifth Annual Assembly to Be Held With a Grand Parade of Uniformed Commanderies.

M. Em. Sir Knight Archibald A. Campbell of London, Ont., supreme grand master, has notified all preceptories of the Order of the Temple, that the 25th annual assembly of the Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada will be held in the Alexandra Theatre, in the City of Toronto, on Wednesday, Aug. 12, at 9.30 o'clock, a.m.

The annual meeting of the grand council will be held at the King Edward Hotel, Tuesday evening, the 11th inst., at 8 o'clock, for the consideration of the reports of the grand officers and other business. To conduct the M. E. Sir K. Rugg of Providence, R. I., grand master of the Grand Encampment of the United States; Col. Arthur McArthur of Troy, N. Y., the grand commanders of Michigan, New York and other states, have accepted invitations to be present. Visiting commanderies, uniformed, will come from Chicago, Detroit, Port Huron, Rochester, Buffalo, Lockport and Niagara Falls, and London, Hamilton, Windsor, Montreal, Sherbrooke, Brantford, Stratford, Chatham, Sarnia are also coming to take part in the grand parade.

This evening the local committee of arrangements hold their final meeting, and the following program, which may be slightly altered, owing to exceptional conditions, is given as official:

Wednesday morning, Aug. 12, the escort committee have arranged for an escort of air knights to meet the incoming trains and hosts to conduct the visiting commanderies and preceptories to their several quarters.

At 9.30 a.m. The escort will await the supreme grand master and his staff at his headquarters, the King Edward Hotel, and conduct them to the place of meeting.

10 a.m.—The Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada, Knights Templar, will open in ample form.

At 10.5 p.m. a reception will be tendered the air knights and ladies at the King Edward Hotel parlors. Those to receive will be the wives of the supreme grand master and his staff, the grand master, the King Edward Hotel, and conduct them to the place of meeting.

8 p.m.—The wives of Toronto will tender a reception to all visiting air knights on board the Cayuga. A call will be taken on the lake. Music will be provided for dancing, and refreshments served. The boat returning to the city about 11 o'clock.

Thursday, 9 a.m.—The Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada, Knights Templar, will hold an assembly at the Alexandra Theatre, for the purpose of giving a formal reception and welcome to all of the visiting commanderies from the United States.
