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NEVILLS IS ACQUITTED AN ALIBI IS PROVEN

Chief Smith Denied That Constable Had Told Him About Identity of His Assailant.

HAMILTON, June 11.—(Special.)—"Not guilty" was the verdict brought in this afternoon by the jury that tried John Nevills on the charge of shooting Constable Harry Smith March 4. The jury was out an hour and a quarter. The constable sworn positively that Nevills was the man, and declared that while he was in the hospital he told Chief Smith so. The chief was called by the defence and said the constable did not tell him. The defence also established an alibi. M. J. O'Reilly, K.C., defended him.

The joint courthouse committee endorsed the proposal to erect a \$40,000 registry office on the court-house square.

William Edmonstone and Albert New who were granted a new trial on the charge of assaulting Thor Macey, had to appear this afternoon to renew bail. New did not appear and a bench warrant was issued.

The county council passed a bylaw limiting the speed of autos on county roads to 15 miles an hour. The Radial Highway will be required to raise its tracks in Barton Township. The legislative committee was given power to settle the county's claim against Saltfleet Township for \$154 arrears in beach taxes.

Frank Quinn, acting chairman of the board of health, complained to the sewer committee about the number of private drains in the city. They became blocked and were a menace to health. Ald. Jutten told him that the board was enquiring. W. Yeates may connect his property on Maple-avenue with the city sewer system, and J. M. Eastwood and James Moodie, who connected with the same sewer without permission, will also be required to sign an agreement.

The aged man who dropped dead this morning in Carroll's grocery store at the corner of York and Caroline streets, was identified this afternoon.

RAILWAY BOARD DEPARTS

Will Hear Important Cases in Thessalon and Bruce Mines.

To-morrow the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board leaves on a trip to Bruce Mines and Thessalon. At the former point they will hear and adjudicate upon the appeals of the local companies against the assessment of the mines. This is under the new provision of the act, which gives the board jurisdiction where more than \$20,000 is involved. Lesser amounts are settled by the county judge.

At Thessalon the board will determine whether the Thessalon and Northern Railway has earned the subsidy. The town is alleging that the company has not fulfilled its obligations, and asks that the amount be not paid.

MILK PASTEURIZATION

Scientists Find This Best Method of Saving Masses.

The American Association of Medical Milk Commissioners have placed their stamp of approval on pasteurized milk. Finding the public tardy in insisting on a certain milk supply, the leading scientists of America as represented at the third annual conference of the commission in Atlantic City this week decided to recommend pasteurization as the only means of saving

the masses from the ravages of impure milk. After 15 years of striving of pure milk it was found that only half of 1 per cent of the milk consumed in the United States came up to the standard fixed by the commission.

Dr. Charles J. C. O. Hastings of Toronto, who returned yesterday from the south, where he attended the conference, says the ideal of an officially certified pure milk supply had not been abandoned as impossible of attainment, although the figures were rather discouraging, yet the propaganda of pasteurization, which all agreed renders milk fit for use and involves little labor, will be recommended. Pasteurization simply means to submit the milk to 159 degrees Fahrenheit for 20 minutes, and then lowering it to 40 or 45 degrees and maintaining it at that temperature until used. Dr. Hastings says pasteurization should be carried out under official supervision. The present treatment given milk in Toronto, he says, is merely a false security, and is no pasteurization at all. Pamphlets will be issued by the local commissioners explaining pasteurization and its uses, and pending proper action by the health authorities the users of milk will be encouraged to use only milk which has been properly treated officially.
