

RACES ON TODAY AT NEW ORLEANS

Thanksgiving Handicap is the Feature of Opening Program.

New Orleans, Nov. 28.—The winter race meeting at the Jefferson Parish track opens tomorrow with a card of six races, the Thanksgiving Handicap, at a mile, has the biggest entry and should furnish a great contest.

There are close to 1000 horses stabled at both of the local race tracks, the Jefferson Parish track and the old Fair grounds.

Within the past forty-eight hours several hundred horses have been transferred from the Fair grounds to the new track, but many of the stables are still at the old racing plant and will be forced to remain there through both meetings.

The office of the racing association was moved from the Fair grounds to the new track yesterday morning. It will only be kept open at the old place now for the reception of entries for the Jefferson Parish racing each morning until 1.30 o'clock.

There has been received from Frank Herold that he will bring down twelve horses from Bowie with him to the new track. Some of them are the property of E. F. Whitney, while the others belong to the Quincey stable. With this stable will come Jockeys G. Walls and M. Brown, the two best apprentice riders in the east this summer, according to the opinion expressed by many turfmen, who race in that section.

Dr. J. S. Tyree will send five horses here, William Oliver four, Senor Yaguelo a small band, Jack Odum two, A. L. Ake seven, J. Lumsden five and D. D. Miskel three. The horses which Odum will bring belong to former Congressman G. W. Loft, owner of Pappoose, Jimmy McIntyre was an arrival from Tijuana and he will ride at the two local meetings at the new track. Jockey Albert Johnson will also ride for this stable. It was Folk who developed Johnson as a rider for a large sum. Johnson has been riding only since last February and is now on equal terms with Jockey Frankie Robinson for second honors in the American Jockey's standing.

Freddie Good, whose seven horses arrived here several days ago from Louisiana, came in from Louisville. Included in the Good stable is Waraw, which he purchased for \$5000 from Jefferson Livingston a few days before the Milling racing season ended. Vernon Sanders, telegraph senior at the Kentucky tracks, was also an arrival from the Falls City.
