

### ASSESSORS BOOST DANFORTH PROPERTY

The assessors of ward one property, whose rolls have just been delivered to the city clerk, have shown that they have unbanded faith in the future of Danforth property. Some land on this rapidly developing thoroughfare has been boosted 100 per cent. in value in the assessment. Several lots on the north side of Danforth, near Broadview, have been raised from \$140 to \$300 a foot. The northeast corner of Danforth and Broadview, on which the Canadian Bank of Commerce stands, has been raised from \$250 to \$375 a foot; the southwest corner, where stands the Bank of Nova Scotia, from \$150 to \$200 and the southeast corner from \$300 to \$400 a foot. The site of Allen's Danforth Theatre has been raised from \$130 to \$215 a foot and the building to \$60,000.
