GENERAL CURRIE VISITS KITCHENER

In Address Declares There is No Need of Conspiration in Canada.

Kitchener, May 9.—(Special).—Gen. Sir Arthur Currie arrived in this city last evening as the guest of the Waterloo Canadian Club. He delivered an address to the club on the glorious part taken by Canadian troops in the great war. Previous to his address he was accorded a civic welcome at the city hall.

Sir Arthur was met at the station by a delegation comprising Mayor Eden, members of the city council, President Milton Cook of the Canadian Club, returned soldiers and Daughters of the Empire. He was accompanied by Lady Currie. He was escorted to the city hall by the Waterloo regimental band, where an address of welcome was read by Mayor Eden, in which his worship expressed regret at the lack of an armory in Kitchener. In responding Sir Arthur declared that he concurred in the opinion of Mayor Eden regarding the need of an armory in Kitchener, and stated that he would call the matter to the attention of the minister of militia. He stated he believed if the citizens of Kitchener were to petition the minister of militia for an armory their wishes would be granted.

Refers to Conspiration.

Touching on conspiracy, Gen. Currie declared that there was no need of conspiracy in Canada, the patriotism of the people being of such a nature as to immediately respond to the call when occasion demanded. At the conclusion of his address at the Canadian Club Sir Arthur was made an honorary member of the association.

St. Catharines Man Donates Land for a New School Site

St. Catharines, May 9.—Fred W. Wilson, president of the St. Catharines Improvement Company, owners of Glen Ridge subdivision, south of the old Welland Canal, and within the city limits, has donated as a school site half a block of land on the main street of the subdivision to the board of education for the new high school building, and offered the other half of the block at its assessed value. The board accepted the offer, which requires the erection of a temporary school building thereon for the fall term this year.

Chatham Athletic Association To Equip an Athletic Park

Chatham, May 9.—With a sum of \$12,500 to its credit, the proceeds of last week's carnival, the Chatham Athletic Association will start immediately to equip an athletic park in the city. As yet it is not known where the sports centre will be, but an announcement is expected in a few days.

Meteorological Office, Toronto, May 9.—The high pressure which covered Canada during the latter part of last week has entirely disappeared and the barometer is now comparatively low. 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SYNOD OF HURON WILL MEET TODAY

Gathers in Brantford for First Time—Church Union to Be Discussed.

Brantford, May 9.—(Special).—For the first time in its history, the Synod of Huron will meet in Brantford, commencing Monday evening. Some 300 delegates will be present from the dioceses of Brant, Bruce, Huron, Elgin, Essex, Kent, Lambton, East Middlesex, West Middlesex, Norfolk, Oxford, Perth and Waterloo.

Bishop David Williams will preside, and among the delegates will be Archbishop Young, D.D., London; Very Rev. Dean Tucker, M.A., D.C.L., London; Archdeacon Richardson, D.C.L., London; Principal Waller, M.A., D.D., Huron College, London; Canon McGill, Owen Sound; Canon Cliff, Stratford; Canon Davis, Sarnia; Canon Carlyle, Windsor; Canon Gunn, London; Canon Vernon and Rev. J. A. Hiltz of Toronto will be present.

CARLOAD OF LIQUOR IS WITHOUT OWNER

Chatham Man, to Whom Shipment Was Addressed, is Dismissed From Charge.

Chatham, May 9.—(Special).—Sam Kovinsky was dismissed in the police court on a charge of having liquor on unauthorized premises. The charge was laid as a result of the seizure of a carload of liquor recently at the C. P. R. freight sheds, consigned in the name of the defendant, as brass trimmings. Defendant is a local junk dealer. He stoutly denied all knowledge of the booze, and stated that he could only account for it by the fact that somebody had used his name to get the liquor to Chatham. R. Scott, C. P. R. agent, swore that he notified the defendant of the arrival of the car, and that he agreed that the contents were for him, several hours before the authorities made the seizure.
