

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 11.—Under the cap-tion, "Athletic Joy-Riding," The Ottawa Cikizen this morring discusses editori-ally the Dominion government grant of \$15,000 to the Canadian Olympic Commit-tee, and says: "The athletic authorities of this coun-try should devote their time and energies and whatever funds may be granted them by the government in developing athletes with a fair chance of making a respectable showing in world contests. The time to do that is between these contests. The plan of selecting athletes on the eve of the Olympic games and sending them abroad—notwithstanding the fact that their records make it clear that they have little or no chance of figuring successfully in the games— should not be encouraged, at least not by the expenditure of public funds.
