The inmates of the school exhibit not only remarkable proficiency, but a steady progress which is highly creditable, and your Committee recommend the Institution to the most favorable consideration of the Legislature, and desire to repeat the recommendation of last year that the debt incurred in enlarging the building be paid out of the Provincial revenues.

Gentlemen,—

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 10th inst.
