## ST. JOHN MAN SUCCESSFUL

Harry A. Comeau Receives Lucrative Appointment in St. John University.

The following item from a New London, Conn., paper, about a St. John man, will be read with pleasure in this city:

"Harry A. Comeau of this city, who has been studying physical culture at the Harvard summer school, was in the city last night on his way to New York, where he will spend a week. Mr. Comeau has secured a position as director of physical training and athletics at St. John's university, Collegeville (Maine). He will take the new position Sept. 11."

"Mr. Comeau graduated from Balliol school in the class of 1903. He has studied the theory and practice of physical culture under Dr. F. Williams for two years and has spent the summer at the Hemenway gymnasium in Cambridge (Mass.)."

Mr. Comeau took second in the sprint at the close of the summer school and won high honors in fencing. He was one of a team of three picked from 188 graduates of the school to meet the team of the Young Men's Christian union of Boston. The Harvard team was victorious. Mr. Comeau has competed in several fencing bouts in Boston this summer with credit.

"At St. John's university he will have entire charge of the athletics, including the coaching of the baseball, football and basketball teams, besides the regular gymnasium classes. He will have two assistants. St. John's university has 600 students enrolled, and has one of the finest gymnasiums in the west."

Mr. Comeau was born in St. John (West), living on Queen street. His family moved to New London about eight years ago. His father is Capt. H. O. Comeau, who sailed on John vessels up to eight years ago. Mr. Comeau spent the summer in St. John two years ago. He was the guest of his uncle, Wm. Lynch of St. John (West), and of Robert Dill of Broad street. He is an all round athlete, and has won several championships in running and fencing in New London.
