Toronto, Ont., March 17—The banks in Toronto have united in inaugurating a campaign to afford themselves and their customers better protection against dishonest business tactics and commercial sharp practices. They have commenced a systematic protest of all checks of more than \$25 dishonored when presented for payment, and it is announced that immediate legal steps will be taken to force the issuers of the worthless checks to meet their obligations at once.
