ST. JOHN LEAGUE

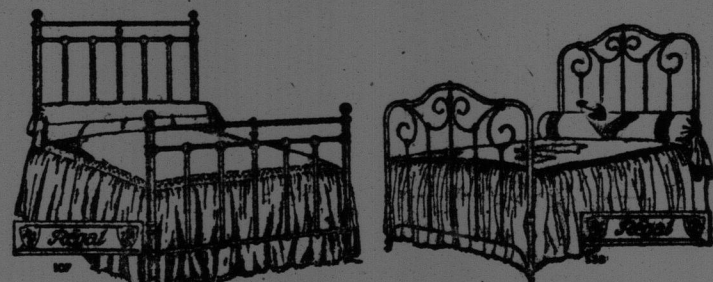

BOWLING

High Scoring at Tournament

A large crowd of bowling enthusiasts were at Black's alleys last night to see the games in the tournament for the Brunswick-Baker-Calendar trophy. Never in the history of the sport in this city did the excitement run higher than when the locals engaged the visiting contestants. Both Black's and the Victoria alley teams hung up new records for a tournament. The latter rolled a total of 1468 in their game against Sussex, and Black's rolled 1449 against St. Croix. Black's team also set a new mark for a single string with a total of 518. The Victorias were only one pin behind with 517. The high single strings for the day were made by Coughlan of the Vics, who had 148, and 180; Wilson of Blacks, 188 and 119, and Casey of St. Croix, 180 and 121. On the whole the bowling of all the participants was above that of former years. The winners will certainly deserve the cup regardless who captures it.

Will Bar Pictures

Mayor Curley declared on Monday that he would not allow the motion pictures of the Willard-Johnson fight to be shown in Boston. "The display of prize fight pictures," he said, "whether between a negro and a white man, whether both principals are white, tends to degrade the standard of public decency. The spectacle of two men pummeling each other around a ring is merely the playing of a form of brutality before the public."

Willard Tallest Champion

In addition to his championship title, Jess Willard enjoys the distinction of being the tallest man who ever fought for the world's championship under the Marquis of Queensbury rules, and the second skyscraper in all history. In the matter of weight, Willard has them all beaten, his 270 pounds being 27 better than Jim Jeffries ever boasted when in fighting trim. Willard's lone predecessor in height was the famous Ned O'Balwin, one of the greatest fighters who records state, had half an inch on Willard.

Receipts Not High

From the standpoint of gate receipts the Johnson-Willard fight at Havana stands second, the receipts being considerably less than half those of the Johnson-Jeffries fight at Reno in 1910. The Johnson-Jeffries fight drew \$270,755, the Johnson-Burns fight in Australia, \$67,000, while the Willard-Johnson battle drew about \$10,000.

Blows Which Won Crown

Sept. 7, 1892.—At New Orleans, La., Jim Corbett knocked out John L. Sullivan, 21 rounds. Right swing to jaw.
March 17, 1897.—At Carson City, Nev., Bob Fitzsimmons knocked out Jim Corbett, 14 rounds. Solar plexus blow, which was a left-hand uppercut to point high up on abdomen, directly over solar plexus of nerves.

June 9, 1899.—Coney Island, N. Y., James J. Jeffries knocked out Bob Fitzsimmons, 11 rounds. Hard right-hand clip to point of jaw sent Fitzsimmons to floor.
Dec. 26, 1908.—At Sydney, Australia, Jack Johnson won technical knockout over Tommy Burns in 14 rounds. He hit Burns a right-hand swing to the head, covering him with blood and knocking him to floor. Burns attempted to rise, but police stopped him. Johnson, who was a left-hand uppercut to point high up on abdomen, directly over solar plexus of nerves.
July 4, 1910.—At Reno, Nev., Jack Johnson knocked out Jim Jeffries, 15 rounds. A stinging short left-hand blow to point of jaw.
