SEEK METHOD TO DETECT PRESENCE OF SUBMARINE

London, June 26—The question of whether there exists any scientific method of detecting the presence of a submerged submarine, which was raised during the Lusitania enquiry, is now engaging the attention of the Admiralty. Suggestions have been made by a prominent Canadian to Donald Macmaster, K. C., who represented the Dominion government at the enquiry, and Mr. Macmaster has submitted these to the Admiralty and to Lord Mersey, and the latter has promised to give encouragement to any experiments in the direction of settling the question.

THE INTERVIEW WITH THE POPE

Rome, June 26—Cardinal Gasquet, Abbot of the Benedictines, has been received in audience by Pope Benedict. The English cardinal protested against the interview with the Pope published in Paris. La Liberté urged a retraction. The envoys of the allies also urged the Pope to retract the interview. It is considered likely that the Pope will issue an encyclical deploring the methods of war employed by the Germans.

Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, regent of the Royal Standard Chapter, daughter of the Empire, has received this week, three letters in connection with the splendid donation of socks, forwarded by her chapter to the Canadian War Contingent Association, for the Canadian soldiers at the firing line.

One letter was from Captain Pinkham of the "Raw Point," assuring Mrs. Smith of the safe arrival of his ship and the immediate forwarding, by him, of the boxes of socks to the London address given.

The second letter was from J. G. Colmer, honorable secretary of the Canadian War Contingent Association, in which he expressed the thanks and appreciation of the association for the splendid donation of socks and assuring Mrs. Smith that particular attention was given to the individual packages and parcels and that they were forwarded to their respective addresses by parcel post immediately. Mr. Colmer also says: "We are sending regular supplies of socks, and from time to time we are forwarding tobacco, pipes, cigarettes, pens, confectionery, matches, handkerchiefs, soap, candles, writing paper and envelopes, books, and magazines, hosiery, buttons, buttons, and a number of other useful articles. Most of these things, of course, it is much better for you to purchase here, and we are receiving contributions from different parts of Canada for the purpose. Supplies of socks are being fairly well maintained, and any other comforts will be welcomed, or money to purchase them." The socks that are folded in two and fastened together by safety pins have always been before, before they can be mailed, they are filled up with these bulky parcels, the things have to be removed as the socks cannot be flat in the boxes.

It is surprising how the sock wiggles away from it, and it is often necessary to spend half an hour in trying to match up perhaps fifty or sixty socks that get loose by the time they reach us. I need not tell you how grateful the association is for the splendid donation which has been forwarded by your chapter.

The ladies had the boxes unpacked and the contents counted and your gift certainly made a magnificent addition to the sock shelves.
