Rev. Dr. Pidgeon, in St. David's Hall, On Social Responsibility

"In the first place," continued Dr. Pidgeon, "always act as a member of society and never perform a private action that you could not wish everyone else to pattern after to the benefit of society as a whole. No citizen seems vorthy to the democratic heritage to which he has fallen unless every action he performs is an expression of his highest ideals of right and feelings of good will towards all mankind." "In the second place," said Dr. Pidgeon, "each citizen should labor carnestly to embody his private conceptions of right in everything that re-presents the public life. We often elect the individuals." He then went on to nstrate the point in three ways. THE FIRST POINT.

St. David's Memorial Hall was filled to capacity last evening when Rev. Dr. E. Leslie Pidgeon, of Erskine church, Montreal, and first Moderator of the United Church of Canada, lectured on "Social Responsibility." O. S. Fraser, the president of St. David's Men's Association, was the chairman of the evening and in a few short remarks introduced the speaker.

In his opening remarks Rev. Dr. Pidgeon defined the foundation of social lity as a unity between iniduals and their societies. child," the speaker said, "grows up to give a personal embodiment to the principles and conceptions that he finds in the common life of his people."
"I believe," said Dr. Pidgeon, "what heredity gives to a child is capacity, whether great or small, but whether this capacity is led out in the direction of moral good or moral evil begins more upon the environment that is absorbed and personalized." That being so nothing shall find an embodiment in our laws, institutions or customs that we do not wish to have rembodied in the character of our future

citizens.

"This conception," the speaker said, "of human relationships seems to me to impose certain concrete duties upon to the highest positions in the state, men whom we would not accept as part to business, and we wonder why things of the public go

"In third place," continued the speaker, "we should seek the welfare of all classes. If any man is living under conditions that prevent him from growing into a large-hearted, clear thinking loyal citizen that throws a weakness into society and that weakness must come hack upon ourselves." weakness into society and that weakness must come back upon ourselves."
