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MEN SHOULD LIVE TILL 150, HE SAYS

New Thought Speaker Predicts
"Divine Thinking" Will
Lengthen Existence

NEW YORK, June 23.—With more than 1,500 delegates attending, some from Canada and England, the thirteenth annual congress of the International New Thought Alliance opened this week in the Hotel Commodore. One of the Unity Society of New York or of the Unity Society of New York City, in an address on "The Prolongation of Life," declared that the average life should last 150 years instead of the present average of 60. He said that one principle of the New Thought movement was the healing of the mind by the power of "divine thought."

"Eternal life is not discovered in the laboratories of man, but in the laboratory of God—the soul of man," he said. "To eliminate imperfect human thought and put on divine thought—right, accurate and scientific thought—is the way to eternal life taught by the Master."

The Rev. Albert C. Grier, pastor of the Church of Truth of New York City, said the physical body of man was breaking down under the strain of an overemphasized brain and asserted that "if the brain continues to increase without the co-operation of the soul the human race is doomed." He spoke on "The Next Step in Evolution."

Magnuson, attached to the provincial immigration department, arrived here yesterday. They had attended on Saturday last the fifty-fourth anniversary celebration of the founding of the settlement.

BRITISH GOVT. HAS NO CONCESSIONS

Report on Panama Affair Made
in U. S. Senate by State
Secretary

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The British Government has secured no concession involving control over public lands and natural resources of the Republic of Panama but a private citizen of England has obtained concessions to prospect for gold mines there, the Secretary of State informed the Senate yesterday in reply to the Borah resolution which sought information on the subject.

The United States Minister at Panama believes concessions have no political significance, the secretary's letter said.

Five Mascots Escape From U. S.

Training Craft—One Drowned

NEW YORK, June 23.—Two boys in the neighborhood of the junior naval training yards at Ninety-seventh street and the Hudson River are recounting their wild adventure in an exciting monkey hunt.

Both boys—Henry McMahon, 11 years old, and John McGloin, 13—were bitten in the mad scramble which followed the exodus of five monkeys on Saturday from the square rigger Ben-jamin F. Packard, a Government training ship. The monkeys escaped a short time after a new reel employee had photographed them. Sailors scattered. The monkeys toppled overboard. One was drowned and another was taken from the water by Seaman George Wagner of the United States ship Illinois, who was in a row boat.

The two boys were on the dock when three monkeys started for the land. They joined in the hunt. The McGloin boy was bitten in the right thumb. The other boy was bitten on the hand. They then abandoned the chase. The monkeys were finally corralled. The two boys were taken to Mt. Sinai hospital where their wounds were cauterized. They were permitted to go home.
