## \$10,000 FIRE IN EARLY MORNING

Damage estimated at \$10,000 was done by fire, which broke out early yesterday morning in the cellar of the brick building, owned by E. Roy Robertson, at the corner of Douglas avenue and Main street. The building is occupied downstairs by Mr. Robertson for his grocery store and also by the branch of the Provincial Bank of Canada. Upstairs, Dr. J. C. Doore and Dr. Francis A. Ainsworth operate a dental parlor. Mr. Robertson last night placed the damage at \$8,000 on the building and \$5,000 on stock, as a rough estimate. All loss is covered by insurance. Several hundreds of dollars damage had been done to the bank fixtures and fittings, all of which damage was covered by insurance, according to A. L. Hastings, manager.

## SIR J. M. BARRIE IN NEW YEAR'S LIST

London, Jan. 2.—Sir James M. Barrie is the most conspicuous recipient of the new year's honors. He is awarded the Order of Merit for services to literature and the drama. This is one of the highest honors and is strictly limited in numbers. Others holding the decoration include Mr. Lloyd George, A. J. Balfour, Lord Morley and Thomas Hardy.

Four new peers are created—Sir James Buchanan, the famous whisky distiller; Sir Robert Nivison, financial adviser to the government and the overseas dominions; Joseph Watson, railway director, and prominent in the racing world, and Lieut.-Colonel Frances V. Willey, head of the Bradford and Boston (Mass.) wool firm.

Among the new knights are Gerald du Maurier, actor-manager, and the actor, Charles Hawtrey; James Joussan Shannon, the artist; Landon Ronald, musician; Professor William Abbott Herdman, scientist, and Colonel Joseph Reid, chairman of the Press Association.

Among the ladies appearing in the new order of the British Empire is Marchioness Curzon of Kedleston, wife of the secretary for foreign affairs, who was the daughter of the late J. Monroe Hinds, United States minister to Brazil, and widow of Alfred Dugan of Buenos Aires. Mrs. Hughes, wife of the Australian premier, receives the same order, both being appointed dames of the Grand Cross, for war services.

Lady Greenwood, wife of Sir Hanser Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, for services in Ireland, and Ethel Smith, the composer, are appointed dames commander.

## STEAMER FROM HERE, WITH LIQUOR CARGO, WHELD AT EASTPORT

The seventy-ton British steamer Harbinger and her crew of ten men were detained at Eastport (Me.), yesterday for investigation by the United States customs officials. This steamer, which has been engaged in the coastwise freight service between Bay of Fundy ports, was recently sold to purchasers in the Bahamas. She loaded a cargo consisting of 300 cases of liquor and sailed from this port on Saturday of last week for Nassau, Bahamas. She arrived at Eastport yesterday. It was alleged, to secure a supply of water and stores but the customs authorities there were suspicious of the steamer and detained her. No further particulars were available last evening regarding the grounds for the detention.

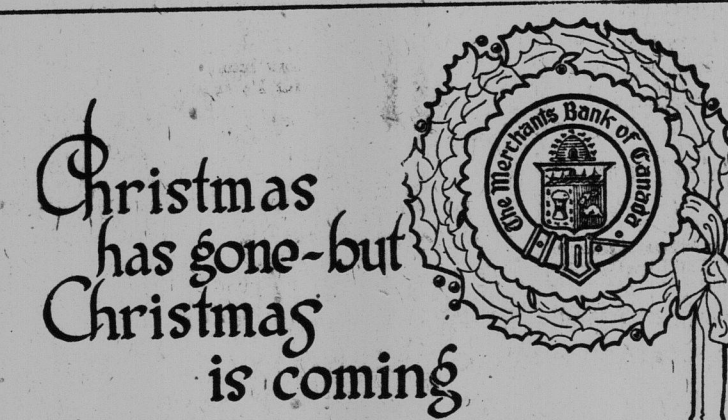
