SOME INSIDE NEWS OF BASEBALL COMES OUT AT HEARING

Ban Johnson Interested In Boston American Club From 1911 To 1914

New York, Sept. 12—Ban Johnson, president of the American League, admitted yesterday on the witness stand before Referee Gillespie that he was interested in the Boston American League club while that club was owned from 1911 to 1914 by James McAlister and Robert McKay. The latter, now deceased, formerly was Johnson's personal secretary. The testimony was given at a hearing before trial of the New York club's suit to restrain him permanently from interfering with the use of Pitcher Carl Mays, recently purchased from Boston.

The fact that Johnson had been interested in the Boston club came out while Johnson was being questioned as to his alleged interest against Harry Frazee, the present Boston owner, said to have been reflected in the case of Mays. Johnson defended his right to communicate with Manager Barrow, rather than with President Frazee on matters of disciplining ball players.

Johnson said he did not suspend Mays immediately upon learning of his alleged insubordination, because he was waiting to see what the Boston club would do in the matter. He said that he suspended the player after he had read a newspaper account of his sale to the New York club. He also defended his right to employ umpires in getting facts concerning discipline on the field, and said he was within his rights in requesting Chas. Hildebrand to question Boston ball players and ascertain all the facts in regard to Mays having left the field in the game played in Chicago on July 15.

REPORT ON CROPS OF PROVINCE

Harvesting Weather Has Been Poor During Week—Rotting of Potatoes Where No Spraying Done

The weekly report of agricultural conditions in New Brunswick, as reported by district representatives of the department of agriculture, follows: Fredericton, Sept. 9.—Extremely unfavorable weather conditions for harvesting the remainder of the hay and the corn crops. The report from all sections is largely gloomy. In the potato belt, there is danger of the grain growing, with a consequent heavy loss. Wind and rain storms have caused the grain to lodge quite badly in many places; this will render it difficult to cut. The grain is a good sample and will give a fair yield if it can be harvested.

EXHIBITION NEXT YEAR

The Exhibition Association met yesterday afternoon at their offices, Prince William street, to consider the taking over of their buildings from the militia department. Messrs. W. E. Burditt, the president, E. A. Schofield, A. O. Skinner and C. B. Allan were appointed a committee to make an inspection of the buildings with the military representatives preliminary to their return. Commissioner Thornton was present at the meeting by invitation and as the city has some considerable interest in the matter of these buildings it was suggested that the council also appoint a committee to assist in the survey. As it is proposed to hold an exhibition here next September the turning over of the buildings and the immediate starting of repairs is important so that as much as possible may be done before the snow flies, leaving but little additional to be done in the spring.

Pilot Ratchford Dead

Sydney, N. S. S., Sept. 12—At New Victoria yesterday Wm. Ratchford died, aged eighty-four years. He was the oldest pilot in the Sydney harbor service, having been actively engaged in that work all his life. He retired about ten years ago.

THIRTY-SEVEN YEARS TO DELIVER LETTER ONLY SEVEN BLOCKS

Washington, Sept. 12—Away back in 1882 a letter was mailed from the Ebbitt House here to Col. Charles E. Sherman, a guest at the Metropolitan Hotel, seven blocks away.

The letter bore the admonition, "Postmaster will please return to above address if not called for in ten days." But the letter, mailed on April 27, 1882, apparently was not called for in ten days, or even in more than thirty-seven years, for it was returned to the Ebbitt House today.

While the letter was going the seven blocks and returning there have been sixteen postmaster-generals. The letter came back to the Ebbitt with the regular return mail. The hotel management is attempting to locate Col. Sherman, to whom the letter was addressed.

REV. G. A. LAWSON IN BOSTON CHURCH

Rev. George A. Lawson, a veteran in the world war, and formerly of Moncton, where he was pastor of the First Baptist church there, will begin his pastorate at the Union Square Baptist church, Somerville, Sunday, September 14. Rev. Mr. Lawson enlisted as a captain in 1915 and in July 1918 was severely injured by shell shock, which confined him to hospital until last January. He was connected with the Y. M. C. A. until his recent appointment.

SWITZERLAND AND THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Berne, Sept. 12—The Swiss parliament was convoked on Monday afternoon for deliberation of the League of Nations. The commission of the national council decided by a vote of twenty-one to four to propose the admission of Switzerland in the hope that the actual league would soon be enlarged into a general league of nations.
