British Crippled Before They Seven Divorces Granted Could Get Within Striking **Distance** 

### SEA FIGHT IN A TERRIFIC GALE

All Over in an Hour—British Loss Very Great, May be Nearly 2,000, But German Casualties Only Two Wounded---**Detailed Story of Naval Battle** 

Valparaiso, Chile, Nov. 4—Officers of the German cruiser Scharhorst expressed the belief today that nearly 2,000 British officers and sailors had been killed in the naval engagement off Coronel. The British cruiser Monmouth, which was sunk, carried a complement of 678 officers and men, and the cruiser Good Hope, the flagship of Rear-Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock, which is believed to have gone down immediately after the battle, carried 900 officers and men. In addition, the British cruiser Glasgow and the Transport Otranto, were struck by shells from the German ships and damaged.

ONLY TWO GERMANS WOUNDED

If, as believed, the fire-stricken and shell-riddled cruiser Good Hope went to the bottom in the gale that was raging during the attle, it is certain that Sir Christopher Cradock, who was commander of the British squadron in Mexican waters, lost his life.

The German cruisers Scharnhorst, Gneisenau, and the Nurnberg, which came into this harbor on Saturday night after the engagement, had steam up at dawn ready to depart. They showed but lttle effect of the fight, and Admiral Von Spee, commander of the German fleet in the Parising reported that only two men had been wounded on the

### Austrian Cruiser Is Blown Up

New York, Nov. 4—The East and West News Bureau made public today he following cable despatch received by them from Tokio:

"The navy general staff today made the following official announcement:

"On November 1 the Japanese fleet, together with English warships, made 1 effective bombardment on the Iltis and other forts. At 3 a. m., November the Austrian cruiser Kaiserin Elizabeth seemed to have been blown up in 1400 Chow Bay. On November 3 the floating dock in the Tsing Tau harbor isted and sunk."

Tokio, Nov. 4—A despatch received here from Tsi-Nan in Shantun provnee, China, says the Japanese forces before Tsing Tau, the fortified position of the German territory of Kiao-Chow, have destroyed twenty-six German runs and captured 800 prisoners.
