JOKER IN THE BILL IS FOUND IN TIME

Might Have Made All Refined Sugar Dutiable at Two Cents and Kill Free Sugar Intention... Washington, June 19.—An eleventh hour discovery that the sugar schedule of the Underwood tariff bill had a 'joker' in it which would have operated to make all refined sugar dutiable at two cents a pound and nullify the provision for free sugar after three years, resulted yesterday, in an amendment to the schedule by a majority of the members of the senate finance committee.

TWO THROWN TO DEATH FROM BIPLANE

Berlin, June 19.—Two German aviators were killed early this morning. An Aviator Kraft, carrying as a passenger a man named Gerbitz, had ascended to make a two-hour flight. The biplane was making good speed, when it suddenly turned a somersault at a height of a hundred feet, throwing the aviators to the ground, where they were killed by dead.

BRITISH ARMY DOES NOT WANT DOCKED HORSES

London, June 19.—Replying to a question by Mr. Greenwood, in the House of Commons yesterday, Secretary of War Seely said as few as possible docked horses were being purchased for the army. An order had been issued, the war secretary said, that no horses so docked should be accepted after three years.

PRINCE TO SETTLE CASE

Heir to Throne Had Action Against a Tenant... London, June 19.—The Prince of Wales will not experience the joys of a legal fight in the higher courts. He had been sued as plaintiff in an action against one of his tenants under the Duchy of Cornwall from which Britain's heir to the throne draws the main portion of income.

ZEPPELIN AIRSHIPS ARE ONLY FOR GERMANY

Friedrichshafen, Germany, June 19.—Count Zeppelin today declared that he was pledged not to accept any foreign orders for dirigible airships. His company would construct dirigibles only for the German government, or for use in Germany. He denied that he had contracted to build six airships for the Austrian army.

LARGE PULPIT CHANGES

BURN EIGHTY GIRLS TO DEATH

Locked in Barn in Russian Village In Trouble Over Labor, Not One Escapes... St. Petersburg, June 19.—Eighty women were burned to death today by villagers enraged at the importation of cheap girl labor to work on a sugar estate in the district of Piratin in the province of Ekolava, Southern Russia, according to the Kiev newspaper, Kiev Liainin.

COAL STRIKE THREATENS

Charleston, W. Va., June 19.—A general strike of miners in the New River coal fields, District No. 20, United Mine Workers of America, will be called next Wednesday afternoon by an announcement of Thomas Hagerty, member of the national Mine board. Fifteen thousand men are employed in this field.

TORONTO WILL SECURE EXPERT ADVICE ON MATTER OF BUYING STREET RAILWAY AND LIGHT PLANT

Toronto, June 18.—After a heated debate the city council last night decided by a vote of 18 to 8 to authorize the board of control to expend \$10,000, if necessary, in securing expert advice with regard to the value of the franchises and all other assets of the Toronto Railway Company and the Toronto Electric Light Company, for the purchase of which the mayor and controllers are negotiating with Sir William MacKenzie, president of the utilities.
