### To Help Young Offenders

A scheme under consideration two years ago in Holland was considered of great value in educating and improving the character of youthful offenders; it consisted in the establishment of a land colony on a somewhat large scale.  
It was found, however, that sufficient money to support the enterprise was not forthcoming. The plans were accordingly much curtailed, accommodation being provided for no more than 20 youths.  
With the object of developing the plan, a society has now been formed at Utrecht, and it is hoped that sufficient progress

will soon have been made to enable a number of youths to be given the necessary instruction in working waste ground, under the direction of capable superintendents, during their period of detention.  
In this way it is believed that when the young men are again free they will have become efficient in certain branches of agriculture, and that they will henceforth prove to be useful members of the community.  
The ground cultivated by these young men will, it is understood, be sold, the proceeds being applied to the development of the enterprise.

## WILL DIG UP MANY STREETS

Contracts for Excavation for Water Work and for Pipe Are Recommended—Some Extensions

The last meeting of the water and sewerage board as it is at present constituted, was held last evening, and a very large amount of routine business transacted. Tenders were opened for sewer and water excavations in several streets, and Pollock & Nies, of the west side, secured the contracts in all, except one instance, and in this case it was decided that the city should do the work by day's work. There were fifteen tenders for supplying cast iron pipe and the check enclosed to cover 10 per cent. of the cost amounted in the aggregate to over \$5,000. The tender of H. Thorne & Co. appeared to be the lowest, and was recommended to the council for acceptance.

The tenders of Pollock & Nies, for excavation work in the following streets, were accepted: Lancaster street, rock 83; earth, 85; Pond street, rock, 83; earth, 85; Chardon street, rock, 34.25; earth, 76; Nelson street, rock, 80.50; earth, 85; St. John street, rock, 84.25; earth, 85. As there was only one tender for Dock and Mill streets and the price was considered exorbitant it was decided to do the work by day's work. No tenders were received for Adelaide street.

The tender of W. H. Thorne & Co. for cast iron pipe was as follows: 12 inch, \$27; 10 inch, \$28.65; 8 inch, \$28.65; 6 inch, \$30; 4 inch, \$29.

A delegation of residents from Paris street was heard with reference to laying a sewer between Paris street and Cranston avenue, and it was decided to comply with the request if the residents would guarantee the sinking fund.

It was decided to lay a three-quarter inch lead pipe in Cranston avenue to supply M. Thompson's house.

The engineer submitted a report regarding the installing of an electric pump at Lancaster reservoir, estimating the cost of maintenance at \$4,000 a year. It was decided that the matter stand over pending a meeting with the Lancaster highway board.

It was decided to replace a sewer running through the premises of S. S. Sime & Co., at a cost of \$1,200, on the understanding that the company pay half the cost.

Miss Janet McLaughlin and Mrs. Stamp wrote asking compensation for damage alleged to have been done to their house by the chocking of the Forest street sewer. The engineer reported that the city is not liable, and his report was adopted.

The engineer recommended that five hydrants be placed as required by the Portland Rolling Mills at an estimated cost of \$300. This was agreed to. It was also of \$300. This was agreed to.

With regard to water extension in Military road, the engineer estimated the cost at \$3,500 and the city was authorized to therefrom would be about \$38.50, or 1 per cent on the outlay. On the recommendation of the engineer, the matter was referred to the recorder, engineer and new chairman of the board.

James H. Hagen wrote asking for the balance due him on a contract for remodeling the caretaker's house at Robertson reservoir. Before a meeting adjourned, Ald. Like asked the members, thanking them for the work of the department. Mayor Ald. Spruce and White and W. Wenton also spoke.

### CANADA'S DELEGATE

Prof. Prince, Representative at International Fisheries Congress in Rome

Professor R. E. Prince has been appointed by the dominion government delegate representative of Canada at the great international fisheries congress, to be held in Rome next month. This congress is held every three years at some capital city. Three years ago it was held in Washington. It includes delegates from every civilized country including Germany, France, Great Britain, China, Japan, Australia, New Zealand and even such small places as Spain, Roumania, and Bulgaria.

Canada has played an important part at these congresses in former years. At the last congress Professor Prince was elected vice-president, and in the absence of the president conducted the proceedings of the congress on a number of occasions. He also made important contributions to the fishing industries of Canada and it was generally recognized that Canada occupied a premier place in the discussion of fishing subjects.

The president of the congress at Rome, His Royal Highness Peter Di Stala, and the Italian government are making great preparations to give the delegates an opportunity to see the important fisheries of the Mediterranean sea. Of special interest to the congress is the great fishery station at Naples, the greatest marine station in the world. Fishing experts have received their training at Naples for many years from all countries, and the fish breeding department is the most complete in existence. Therefore the members of the congress will have this great advantage when officially visiting the institution.

Professor Prince expects to be away a couple of months and the fisheries of Canada are bound to benefit by what he learns and sees in his experiences at this important congress in Italy. Professor Prince is Canadian commissioner of the international fisheries commission, being associated with President Starr Jordan of Leland Stanford university.
