#### The Provincial Budget

Hon. Mr. Murray Heard in Able Budget Speech; Determined and Successful Effort for Economy

Fredericton, N. B., April 9-In representing the budget to the legislature today the Provincial Secretary laid before the house facts and figures which showed clearly and without equivocation the actual and exact condition of the finances of the province during the year which has passed and the Government proposals for the coming year.

In doing so he took occasion to refute the criticisms which have been made by the Opposition since the presentation of the public accounts, to vindicate the present administration and to place the blame for anything worthy of blame where it belongs, on the shoulders of the former administration now represented on the opposite benches.

"It is they," he said, "who have rolled up the debts and it is their unpaid bills which have made the deficit what it is. If they had included all their transactions in their accounts the result would have been the same. It is one thing to show a balance on the books and quite another to show a balance after the bills are paid. The former Government showed a surplus, we show a deficit and the deficit is just as harmless as the former surplus.

Going into details, Hon. Mr. Murray shows that the former Government, having been in office five months of the fiscal year was directly responsible for five-twelfths of the expenditures and equally responsible for a great part of the remainder through arrangements made and contracts entered into before they left office. "The statements of the opposition press that the province has suffered through extravagance or inefficiency on the part of this Government are not justified and are not founded on facts," he commented.
