Besides the special box for the royal family there are 2,208 box seats, 12,-232 ordinary seats and standing room for 12,470 persons, a total of 20,910. There also are 3,000 seats overlooking the swimming pool, making the total espacity of the stadium about 30,000. Prices for standing room probably will be only twelve cents.

An unusual feature is a straightaway of 168 metres on either side. The cinder path is 600 metres around and 7½ wide. Before the imperial box there is a special 100 metre track for the sprints. The centre of the stadium comprises a football field and two fields for gymnastics, weight throwing, jumping and similar sports. The swimming pool is 100 metres in length and 22 metres in width.
