The real fact is, however, that the horse is greatly injured in appearance.

It would be easy to multiply authorities showing the commercial folly, the artistic absurdity and the practical uselessness of these bearing reins, so that long before humanity calls out, some sane world has the matter settled, but experience shows that neither of these produces the desired end. Ignorant owners allow lazy coachmen to do as they please. Proud women vainly imagine that their tortured animals are exhibiting their spirit when they stamp and twist and toss and snuff. And, doubtless, many shrewd men are as ignorant as their masters. Fortunately there is a law which can take hold of it, and a society whose duty it is to enforce the law. A new development of this particular cruelty appears to have blossomed out, as a drive or walk along our fashionable streets will disclose. The spirit of the people is against it and any effort made by proper authority to compel a humanity which other considerations fail to secure would be in harmony with the desire of the general public.

The military chestnuts above named were brought in strange contact a few days ago at New Orleans, La., on the 9th of January, 1883, when the 182d Grand Monthly Drawing of the Louisiana State Lottery took place, immediately after the anniversary of the Battle of New Orleans, known there as St. Andrew Jackson's day. It is observed on this happy holiday, the City of New Orleans, La., has always done the entire management of the distribution of \$250,000 in prizes, and here is what they did with it: Ticket No. 10,454, sold for \$5 to Alvin Kenner, of Odessa, La. Fayette county, Mo. drew \$75,000. Ticket No. 8,886 drew \$25,000—sold in fifty (for \$1 each)—one \$5,000 to Augustine Lopez, 96 Berne St.; another \$5,000 to T. Tagliapietra, 125 Canal St., both of New Orleans. Among others, the third capital prize of \$10,000, won by ticket No. 86,401, sold in fifty in New York City. Tickets No. 22,283 and 70,755, drawing each \$6,000, were sold in fifty—one to N. B. Apple, of Omaha, Neb., one collected through the Union and Planters Bank of Memphis, Tenn.; one to J. A. Ketchum, No. 428 Broadway, New York City, one to B. E. Stevens, of Titusville, Pa. Tickets No. 23,230, 23,633, 23,950, 78,616, 83,672, each drew \$2,000, scattered over the country.
