DOMINION.

Halifax is making a big push to secure the Dominion exhibition this year.

What is believed to be a valuable seam of coal has been discovered at Little Harbor, Digby.

Progress is the name of a new eight page weekly paper to be issued in St. John early in May.

Woodsstock has been assessed at \$12 612 for the current year.

Mr. W. F. MacCoy has been appointed Recorder of the City of Halifax.

R. Maxwell of Westville, N. S., has secured the contract for 60 miles of fencing on the I. C. R.

The speaker's salary of the general parliament, Ottawa, is \$4,000.

Ward C. Pittfield has purchased for \$57,500 the dry goods store property of T. R. Jones & Co., St. John.

Among the Dominion appropriations is the sum of \$1,000 for the removal of lobster rocks in Yarmouth harbor.

The first train to get through from Toronto to Ottawa by the Canadian Pacific, after the great storm, was 4 hours on the way.

The oatmeal millers association of Canada have intimated that a further advance in oat products will shortly take place.

It is said that the Merchants Bank of Halifax will establish a branch in St. John, as soon as the Maritime Bank affairs are settled.

St. George's Church says the section of the Short Line Railway between Fredericton and Salisbury will be constructed this summer.

The New York Freestone Quarrying Co. are making preparations for extensive operations at Wood Point, N. S., during the coming season.

The Victoria Hospital, Fredericton, will be opened in early summer.

Wm. Lewis & Son, of St. John, are making two iron bridges for the I. C. R., which will be erected at Nappan and Bathurst respectively.

R. Churchill & Sons have the timbers ready for a steamer of 400 tons which they intend to build and run between Windsor Basin, ports, and Boston.

The British Colon has salmon pack in 1887 amounted to 202,511 cases, valued at \$1,000,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Donnelly, the temperance evangelists, recently closed a lengthy season in Toronto, six hundred people having signed the pledge.

The Supreme Court of N. S. lately decided that County Court Judges could not grant writs of certiorari taking out Act cases into their courts.

The quantity of flour received at St. John during the present week has been much in excess of that which has arrived in any week previous for some time.

The New Brunswick Silver and Gold Mining Company has applied to the local government for incorporation.

The Road Department of Montreal spent \$283,000 last year, of which \$182,000 was expended on permanent pavements.

The safe at the railway station, Parrboro, was broken open last week and a quantity of papers and about \$40 in cash were stolen.

Mining licenses have been recently sold in the northern portion of New Brunswick of Crown lands.

The Y. M. C. A. of Amherst have opened their new hall in the Bank of Nova Scotia building.

Acadia Missionary Society.

Many former members of this society will be glad to know that it flourishes still. The monthly meetings are now held on Sunday instead of on Wednesday evening as formerly.

At the last meeting, on the 18th inst., a thoughtful and interesting address was delivered by Rev. H. Foshay, of Windsor.

After making reference to the time when he was a student here, and to the students of that day, the living and the deceased, Mr. Foshay said: "Christianity is essentially a missionary religion. The Lord's people have been slow in apprehending this. The Old Testament opens with a broader view of the purposes of God regarding the human race than the chosen people were prepared to receive."

As the plan was unfolded with the passing centuries still it was imperfectly understood. After the advent of Christ the same imperfect vision characterized the intimate disciples. Illumination in regard to the kingdom did not come to the apostles till the manifestation of the Spirit at the Pentecostal season.

Even after this Peter needed special enlightenment in respect to the privileges open to the Gentiles. Paul appears to have been specially called to show what great blessings were made ready for all men through faith in Christ.

The marvellous extension of the Gospel among the nations of the earth in the first century after the death of Christ was owing to the fact that the church had perceived the essential character of the Christian religion, and had been brought into vitalizing sympathy with it.

The truth was obscured or lost for a time; hence a church in union with and under control of the state, and a period of superstition and darkness for Christendom.

At length earnest souls apprehended once more the truth of salvation by faith, and were moved to carry the gospel wherever they might find opportunity.

This introduced the period of modern missions, in which the triumphs of the church have equalled those of its primitive period.

Even a few years ago, Christians were praying that idolatrous nations might be opened to the truth. Now the world is inviting Christian labor. The call is for men and means to accept the fields that are ready for the harvest.

Never were the hearts of so many young men and women thrown to missionary work. It is a glorious time in which to live. The purposes of God will be fulfilled. We may rest on that, and be strong. He closed with some valuable practical suggestions to any who might be intending to become missionaries.

Of course the foregoing is merely an outline of the address. The interest of the meeting was increased by E. says, by Messrs. C. H. McIntyre and G. P. Raymond.

In the evening, Mr. Foshay preached in the Baptist church, by request of Rev. Dr. Higgins. The pastor of Windsor Church will always be well received in Wolfville.
