#### WRESTLING TONIGHT.

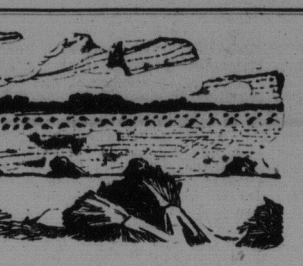

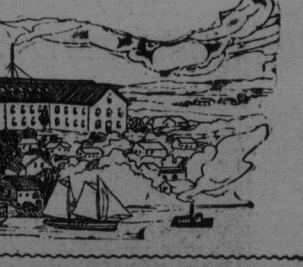

# MARITIME PROVINCE HAPPENINGS DAY BY DAY

## CONDENSED FOREIGN NEWS

### Liner Aquitania Successfully Launched Yesterday — Bel- gian Soldiers Desert to Strikers after Killing Com- rade.

**Largest Steamships.**  
Glasgow, Scotland, April 21.—The largest steamship ever built in Great Britain, the Cunard liner Aquitania, was successfully launched on the Clyde today. The new vessel is double-shelled and carries boats sufficient to accommodate 4,250 persons, the entire complement of passengers and crew. She is a vessel of about 47,000 tons gross.

**Soldiers Join Strikers.**  
Fontaine-leveque, Belgium, April 21.—Two Belgian soldiers, who were on guard at a steel mill protecting the property against the possibilities of an attack by strikers, left their posts today and carried their rifles with them. They were pursued by a military patrol which was about to capture them, when both deserters fired, killing one of the pursuers.

**Abrogate Treaty.**  
Washington, April 21.—Abrogation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty and the Clayton-Bulwer treaty which preceded it is the object of a joint resolution which Senator Chamberlain of Oregon, prepared today for presentation to the senate and reference to the foreign relations committee.

**Noted Sportsman Dead.**  
London, April 21.—Sir Charles Day Rose, president of the Royal Aero Club, yachtsman and breeder of rare horses, died today with tragic suddenness. He made his first flight as a passenger in an aeroplane at Hendon this afternoon and was delighted with his novel experience. On his way to his home in a motor car he died from heart failure.

**Arrested For Theft.**  
Montreal, April 21.—Howard Rogers, who says he is a native of Yarmouth, N. S., and ran four years on seamen sailing from Halifax and St. John, is under arrest here today, held for the theft of \$200 from his employer in the Waterbury, Mass., and \$180 from the Northeastern Lunch of this city.

### MONCTON WATCHING FOR RAISED CHEQUES.

Moncton, April 21.—The passing of a raised cheque in Chatham on Saturday is attracting considerable attention in railway circles. It is reported that a man went into J. A. Irving's store and made the purchase of some goods, stating that he did not have the change, but wished to pay for goods with an I. C. R. cheque for \$94.51. The cheque was accepted and the purchaser was handed back \$50. Later it was seen the cheque had been raised from \$4.91 to \$94.91.
