Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years old, who was at the commencement of the
present war, and has since continued to be a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
may homestead a quarter-section of available
Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or
Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict. Entry by proxy may be made on certain
conditions. Dues—Six months residence upon
and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure
an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption.
Dues—\$3.00 per acre. Dues—Rent six months
in each of three years after entering homestead
plot of cultivated 50 acres extra. May obtain
pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent
on certain conditions.
A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth
\$300.00.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
for entry, returned soldiers who have served over
four years have been honorably discharged, receive
one day priority in applying for entry at local
Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge
papers must be produced to Agent.
