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COUNTERFEIT BILLS AFLOAT AT SYDNEY

Spurious Ones and Twos of Bank of Nova Scotia and Union Bank of P. E. Island Being Circulated.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 23.—Counterfeit bills of the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island and Bank of Nova Scotia are in circulation in Cape Breton and parts of the Sydney. The denominations are one and two dollars.

Judging from the number of complaints from all directions it is evident that the circulation of the counterfeit bills is pretty well flooded with the counterfeiters.

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MIGHT LOSE 1,000 CANADIANS THEIR JOBS

That Many Masters and Mates in American Vessels, and to Limit Certificates to British Citizens Would Lead to Retaliation.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—The special committee of the commons on Mr. Lancaster's bill to provide that master and mates' certificates be granted only to British subjects had another meeting this morning.

The minister of marine said that his information was during the past ten days for inland certificates had been issued for inland and minor waters. Only ten had been issued to foreigners and of these only four to Americans.

On the other hand it was believed that there were on American ships at least 1,000 masters and mates whose certificates in Canada would be prohibited if the bill were enacted. The Americans would retaliate and throw all the Canadians out of employment.

Large quantities of liquors are brought into Maine daily for which the charges are paid on delivery. Under the law as it is at present interpreted such liquors coming from another state are not liable to seizure until the transportation company has done something necessary in the delivery of them, even if they are intended for unlawful sale.

OTTAWA HOUSE INTO COMMITTEE ON TARIFF

Opposition Want Increase of Duties on Market Garden Stuff and Fruits—New Senators Introduced.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—The house then went into committee today on the tariff. On the item of sugar and tobacco, 17 1/2 per cent. British preferential, 23 per cent. intermediate, and 27 1/2 general tariff.

WOULD END C. O. D. MAINE LIQUOR TRADE

Portland, Me., Jan. 23.—No liquor marked C. O. D. whether intended for illegal sale or not, may be lawfully delivered in this state if congress gives passage to Congressman Littlefield's bill on which the House committee on judiciary decided today to make a favorable report.

As it has been decided by the courts of Maine that the sale is made outside the state, where the order is sent and supplied, and where the money is collected, the bill, if passed, will make a vital change in the interstate situation and reverse the present interpretation of the Interstate law by Maine justices. Liquors shipped on credit or prepaid will not be subject to seizure, provided they are not for illegal sale.

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Ottawa, Jan. 23.—(Special)—The total immigration from the United States to Canada for the calendar year 1906 was 63,856.

Chatham Man Seriously Injured.

Chatham, N. B., Jan. 23.—(Special)—James Beck, an employe in the Dominion Pulp Mill, met with a very painful accident this afternoon. He was knocked off a pile of logs on which he was working and struck on the chest by a log, the blow breaking three ribs besides causing internal injuries.
