In December, 1891, Jas. S. Gale, B.A., who had been our missionary in Corea for two years, severed his connection with the Association. A propisition to unite came from the Mission Board of the Toronto Medical Students' Y. M. C. A. This was accepted and a basis of union agreed upon. Thus was formed on April 1st, 1892, The Canadian Colleges' Mission, which has grown in numbers and influence each year, and now includes thirty-five organizations in the Colleges of Ontario and Montreal. Among these are the University of Toronto Y. M. C. A, and Y. W. C. A.; the Toronto Medical Students' Y. M. C. A.; Womens' Medical College; Normal Schools of Toronto and Ottawa; Ontario Agricultural College; McGill College Y. W. C. A.; Ontario Veterinary College; Ontario College of Pharmacy; Coligny College, Ottawa; Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby; Demill Colleges at Oshawa and Toronto; Western University London; Brantford Young Ladies' College; Presbyterian Ladies' College, Toronto; thirteen Model Schools and two Collegiate Institutes.

The objects of the mission are two-fold:

- To propagate the Gospel of Christ in Corea and other unevangelized nations.
- 2. To foster a missionary spirit in Canadian Colleges.
