But when it comes down to havel facts the reason for the better fas on the mink is due to the fact that the animals have had better feeding than they have had for years past. They are great fish eaters. With the trout streams reduced to mere ribbons of water, the big trout all went to the deep pools and became prisoners there. With plenty of water to move about in a trout is abundantly able to take care of itself as against the mink. A Handsome Jersey Bull.

One of the finest young Jersey bulls that ever came to Nova Scoia, has just arrived by American Express, to head the Hillsdale herd of Jerseys at Brookfield, Colchester Co., next season and will be of owned by our enterprising breeder on Park street, Truro.
