THE COMMITTEES' RECOMMENDATIONS

Finance

3. That the account of the Water Commission for cost of construction of mains and connections be passed for payment as far as it concerns charges for connections, same to be charged to local improvements, that the cost of mains constructed be laid over for further consideration.

4. That the Water Commission be requested, to have money required for mains raised by Water Commission Debentures.

Fire and Light

1. That five 400 watt lamps be placed on Queen Street South at intersections.

2. That an electric gong be placed in the Fire Chiefs residence at a cost of \$34.25.

DOUBLE SHOOTING TRAGEDY SUNDAY

OCCURRED AT ALVINSTON VICTIMS BEING TWO BOYS

One Shoots Himself Through Head

Alvinston Nov. 2.—A double shooting fatality of a distressing nature occurred yesterday in the woods about a mile north of this place, when a party of boys were out hunting.

The victims are Ernest Horspool and Russell Barnes, both lads of 16 or 17.

Seeing a squirrel coming down a tree trunk these two boys together started around the tree after it.

Horspool armed with a .32 caliber rifle fired at the squirrel and shot Barnes through the brain as he came around the tree. Barnes died instantly.

Young Horspool, seeing what had occurred passed a remark to the effect that he would be hanged for killing his friend. His companions advised him to go to a house near by and report the accident. He started to do so, but on the way released his rifle which was empty, and put a bullet through his own head above the left eye, dying almost instantly.

The shooting occurred about 1 o'clock in the afternoon and Dr. Newell, of Watford was notified on account of the absence in Toronto of Dr. J. B. Martyn, coroner.

Decides It Accident.

On his return the coroner decided that the shooting of Barnes was plainly accidental and that young Horspool undoubtedly suicided and an inquest was not ordered.

Barnes' parents live in Brooke Township about a mile east of Alvinston. Horspool comes from near Bridgeton but had been living with a sister in the same neighborhood as his friend.
