## SOLDIERS WILL GO ON WITH CANVASS

### THOUGH CANDIDATE IS ABSENT, (Special to The Record)

Hamilton, Oct. 15.—Despite the fact that their soldier candidate, Captain M. L. As he left for the old country before the election date was announced it is thought probable that he remains ignorant of the situation. Even though the whereabouts of Captain Fitzgerald were still a mystery, the G.A.C.'s campaign committee to-day was arranging for mass meetings in various sections of the city for the remaining nights of the week.

## DRAYTON APPEALS FOR VICTORY LOAN

### A MEETING OF ONTARIO DIVISION (Special to The Record)

Toronto, Oct. 15.—Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance addressed the new Ontario division of the Canadian Manufacturers' association, which was organized to-day, with George H. Douglas, of Hamilton, chairman of the division and John R. Shaw of Woodstock, Vice-Chairman.  
Sir Henry Drayton said: "Paying our debts is one thing and carrying on is another. Business must go on. We must continue to produce to 100 per cent, or even 110 per cent, and we must sell our surplus goods."  
"How are we to sell? The country is committed to \$125,000,000 of foreign credits. Every red-blooded Canadian wants to see our products go overseas and believes that old John Bull will go on and pay his debts in the future as he did in the past. Canada must hold the bank for some time and see that Canadian exports go out. The C.M.A. is going to do its best to see that this loan is a success, and that 'Canada Limited' is a success and the factories are going to be left open to Canadian workmen."

### Prospects Without Them is Dis- Mal

The hockey outlook for the coming season in New York is far from bright. As a matter of fact, it is dismal. Efforts are being made to reorganize the Amateur Hockey League, which so successfully governed the sport in New York for many years, but thus far nothing of a definite nature has been accomplished. If the league should be revived, it appears that no more than three clubs will be in it. The New York Athletic Club has definitely determined not to put a team on the ice this winter. The Crescent Athletic club however, will have a team whether there is a league or not.

It is understood that the St. Nicholas Skating Club will organize a team if there is a league, and it is possible that the Hockey Club of New York will be represented. It is improbable that the Irish-American A.C. will have a team. When the United States entered the war the L.A.A.C. decided to suspend athletic activity, and since that time it has been inactive.

Last year the league suspended operations. It was the first season in many years that the A.H.L. had been inactive. This was due to the war. A majority of the players entered the service and there were not enough left in this city to furnish the different clubs with strong teams. Playing in this city of the amateur teams were quite a few Canadians and the majority of these men returned to Canada and joined the Canadian forces. Few of them have returned to this city.

## CLOSURE MAY BE USED IN G.T.R. CASE

CANVASSERS OF MEMBERS OF SENATE  
SHOW THAT MAJORITY IN  
UPPER HOUSE ARE LIKELY  
TO APPROVE MEASURE.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—The Grand Trunk debate will open to-morrow. In the morning the Liberals will hold a caucus to decide upon their attitude, but it seems to be certain that they will oppose the legislation. They will strongly protest against the bill asking for ratification of the agreement being passed this session, and will ask for a postponement until next session. If this is refused as it undoubtedly will be then the Liberals will likely fight the bill and compel its passage by closure.

This question came up only once in the House to-day, when Hon. Arthur Meighen cabled correspondence between Sir Alfred Smithers and the Government. He also tabled a statement of the earnings and indebtedness of the road.

The Senate is not likely to go on the ramparts on the bill. A canvass of its members shows that a majority are likely to approve the bill, particularly because no alternative is suggested. When it came to be analyzed the situation disclosed that all the sincere Opposition comes from Montreal headed by the two English dailies and the Board of Trade. They seem an impairment of Montreal's status as a railway center if the G. T. R. is sold out.
