

Was promoted to a lieutenancy in the 4th King's Own Regt. ; served throughout the Eastern campaign of 1854-55-56 with the 4th Regt. and on the Staff, including the battle of Alma, affair of Bulganac, McKenzie's Farm, capture of Balaklava, battle of Inkerman, siege and fall of Sebastopol; specially mentioned in the despatches of Lord Raglan for having, when in command of a detachment of the 4th Regt., in the advanced trench before Sebastopol, repulsed two attacks of the Russians on the night of the 22nd Nov., 1854; and again thanked in Lord Raglan's despatch for his conduct at the attack and occupation of the Cemetery, 18 June, 1855, on which occasion he was Aide-de-Camp to Lt.-Genl. Sir Wm. Eyre, K.C.B. (medal with three clasps; Kaffir war medal; Brevet of Major; Knight of the Legion of Honor of France; Knight of the Order of Medjidie of Turkey, and Turkish war medal).—*(Salary \$4,000.)
