The way things went for the Mississauga Reps during the Christmas tournament break, they'll no doubt be anxious for the next series of tournaments.

The Reps won four grand championships and one consolation championship last week.

The Reps' biggest accomplishment was a sweep of the Riverside Minor and Major Bantam Tournament in Windsor.

The Minor Bantam A Reps overcame the odds and took their section while the Bantam AA Reps won the Bantam championship.

"Nobody expected us to win it," said Peca Bros. Minor Bantam coach Tom Dwyer.

"Our goalies, David Hawkins and Wayne Cowley, were the talk of the tournament. Without them we'd have gone home pretty early."

The Reps won three of their four games in overtime. They opened with a

4-3 overtime victory over Windsor with Rick Jones scored at 3:28 of overtime. Wayne Stott, Peter Dwyer and John Castellarin got the other goals.

The only easy game was an 8-2 win over Newmarket. Dwyer and Jones had two goals apiece with Castellarin, Paul Papagno, Tim Harnett and Steve Norheim adding one apiece. John Wozzack and Dwyer had three assists.

Castellarin scored in overtime to give the Reps a 4-3 overtime victory over Kitchener in their next game. Terry Demetrioux, Stott and Wozzack got the other goals while Randy Koroll had three assists.

Stott scored at 3:37 of overtime to give the Reps a 4-3 victory over Windsor and the championship. Jones, Norheim and Koroll got the other goals.

BANTAM AA
A lesson in how to play hockey was handed out in the most undiplomatic of

The Indians defeated the Agincourt Canadians with little trouble, 4-2 last Monday night but lost to Stoney Creek, the eventual champions, 6-3 on Tuesday. Stoney Creek defeated Agincourt 3-2 for the A division championship.

Primeau did not worry that the team's performance would influence the play of his team as the Indians start a six game exhibition tour in Finland tonight.

Other Mississauga girls teams fared somewhat better than the Indians in the King Clancy tournament, which attracted 54 teams for six divisions. Pike's Moving blanked Westwood 2-0 in the final of the Bantam house league division and Primeau Robert got past Willowdale 3-2 to win the Peewee championship.

The Indians will be playing, among others, all-star teams from Finland and Sweden. Primeau hopes to inaugurate a world championship for women the following year.

**Kells returns to league
he once slapped in face**

After the Mississauga Chiefs (now the Builders) lost out to Peterborough in the seventh game of a brawl-filled Junior A lacrosse semi-final series in 1976, coach Morley Kells announced his intention never to return to Junior lacrosse.

"I had never planned on coming back to Junior lacrosse next year (1977) and I certainly don't plan to now," said Kells, who had taken over the coaching duties half way through the season. "I don't like the amateur game and I don't really understand the teenage mind. The calibre of play is something less than I'm used to."

Kells left, rising to the heights of an Etobicoke alderman, leaving the job vacant for Brian 'Butch' Keegan. However, Kells has apparently either come to understand the workings of a teenage mind or has chosen to tolerate it to get back into lacrosse.

Kells was named coach of the Rexdale Warriors last week and, in typical Kells style has already attracted

attention. He is promising Etobicoke residents a Minto Cup next summer.

"I coached a Novice team in Long Branch seven years ago," said Kells in an interview with the Etobicoke Guardian. "I said then that the kids on the Rexdale team would one day win at the Junior level. I believe this will happen next summer."

Kells, along with Keegan, was hoping for the revival of an eight team semi-pro league this summer but the plans have fallen through. The league idea collapsed when Montreal, and subsequently Quebec City, dropped out. Kells helped form the National Lacrosse League in 1974.
