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beginning of the case for the Defence "Do you intend to call any other witness in your defence?" was answered in the negative, the evidence is finally allowed to be given by agreement between Court, Judge-Avocate and Prosecutor.

1st Character Witness, Major Peacock, Lorne, Scots, having been duly sworn is examined by the Defending Officer.

- Q.357 - Major Peacock you are an officer of the Lorne Scots?
A.357 - Yes, sir
Q.358 - Do you know the accused Mr. H. T. Robb?
A.358 - I do
Q.359 - How long have you known him?
A.359 - Since 1936
Q.360 - Do you know his family in Canada?
A.360 - Yes
Q.361 - His father?
A.361 - Yes, I know Judge Robb quite well and his brother as well
Q.362 - Are the family highly respected?
A.362 - Very much so
Q.363 - What is your knowledge of Mr. Robb's service in the N.F.A.M.
A.363 - Very good, sir. In the N.F.A.M. he was in a different company and I only saw him at the annual training of the unit but since the outbreak of the War I have been in contact with him since the early Spring of 1940 and his work has been exceptionally good during the time I was serving with him. He worked with me on schools at Niagara during the summer of 1940 and did an excellent job and was so well thought of that he was taken on the training school from there and certainly did a good job - what I saw of it from that time
Q.364 - His record with the regiment is very good then?
A.364 - To my knowledge excellent. I have never heard any criticism
Q.365 - Well thought-of by the officers?
A.365 - Very well
Q.366 - Respected by the men?
A.366 - Yes, sir. I don't think there is any more respected man in the unit

Prosecutor declines to cross-examine this witness

Court is closed for consideration of the sentence

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
