

work in the forests, and upon the Fraser River, cutting and handling the logs—altogether about 3,000 men.

## BIG PAY ROLLS

The money distributed among the residents of New Westminster from the saw mills alone amounts to \$45,000 per month, while the amount paid to the loggers and river men whose headquarters are in New Westminster amounts to approximately \$60,000 per month. New Westminster is one of the centers for the famous salmon fisheries in which 17,000 are engaged. The value of the fish products of the Fraser River is estimated at \$5,000,000 per year.

## NEW INDUSTRIES

In addition to the new manufacturing industries now in operation many new ones are in course of construction or proposed for the present summer.

A site for a new Turpentine Factory has been purchased. A new Crystal Glass Factory is now installing machinery. The new Wooden Pipe Factory has been completed and the Schaaque Machine Works is completing large additions to their plant. An English company with a capital of \$200,000 is being organized by Mr. Walter Ellis and Mr. John Davidson for the manufacture of wooden heels from Fraser Valley cottonwood and alder. These heels will ultimately supplant the present leather heel for all kinds of boots. This industry will employ 168 men. Another English com-
