## R. WHINEYS

But It May Be Increased As Protests Are to Be Made.

Mr. Marcourt Gots Only 20 Majority in Monck-Government's Resignation Not in Yot, But May Gome At Any Time-Mr. Whitney's Thanks For

Comprehensives.

Toronto, Jan. 27.—Although Mr. Whitney will probably be able to worry along on his slim majority of 40 this figure is liable to grow before the Legislature meets. A tie is claimed in West Huron by Dudley Holmes, while M. G. Cameron says he has four majority. A recount is altogether probable. The Conservatives will also ask for a recount of the ballots cast in Kingston, where the majority is only 16 in Prince Edward, where Dr. Currie has three majority and in Peel where John Smith has only 18 of a margin.

Complete returns are in from quite a large number of the constituenties and show a considerable increase in the Conservative popular majority. Only eight Conservatives had majorities less than 100. Premier Ross is quite safe in West Middlesex, but he came within 100 votes of deteat. Hon. Mr. Harcourt had 15 in Monok. The majorities so far as aggertained are:

PREMIER SEES GOVERNOR. nation May Be Already Handed In But Cabinet Meets to Decide

About Things. Premier Ross paid a visit to the Lieutenant-Governor yesterday afteration; but whether his resignation was handed in or not is not known. The Lieutenant-Governor and Mr. Ross have nothing to say, it is expected that a Cabinet meeting will be held to-day at which the Government will decide what course to pursus.

There is little or no routine work to be done in any of the departyments. That was finished some weekage in anticipation of what has happened. The usual procedure in the British Government is to hand in the resignation to the Crown, and after a reasonable time in which the Government may dispose of routine business. Parliament is called. The Lieutenant-Governor, representing the King in Ontario, would hen call upon Mr. Whitsey to form a Government, but before accepting office each member will go back to his constituents for re-election. It may be that the Premier's resignation is in the hands of the Lieutenant-Governor, and that nothing will be given out until after the Cell fet, has met, or it may be that Mr. Jiss will consult his ministers beight forwarding all be given.

Mr. Whitney is not expected in the city till Saturday. As soon as the Lieutenant-Governor has the Premier's resignation he will send for Mr. Whitney. Not till then will the names of the new Cabinet be definitely known.
